

He found his mission in Peru

A funny thing happened to Rudy Fedus on the way to Peru 27 years ago. He got hooked on the place — cannibals, chiggers, monkey meat and all. A Livonia resident, Fedus is probably best remembered for his work at Cranbrook in Bloomfield Hills and Greenmead, Livonia's historical site. He was once referred to as "a man for all seasons" because of his horticultural accomplishments that include the restoration of the Cranbrook rock gardens after a decade of neglect.

But few people know about his adventures in the wilds of Peru where some of his favorite friends are cannibals and where he works with the Seventh Day Church missionaries in trying to make life a little better for the Peruvian Indians in general.

In the 27 years he's been making the trek on his own, Fedus has observed that life for the villagers who come out a living wherever there is a speck of dry land along the Amazon River has changed very little. They still work very hard for very little, existing at land with ancient tools, stilling mainly on a diet of fish and ravaged by disease due to the lack of medical facilities.

SO WHAT? A nice, gentle guy like Rudy Fedus doing in a wild place like that? Helping people, that's what.

Every January, Fedus tries to work a little special magic — sometimes by sleight of hand in magic tricks he does to bring smiles to their solemn, weather-beaten faces or in the form of good work he performs with the Seventh Day Adventist missionaries who operate from a small settlement in Pucallpa on the Ucayali River, about an hour by plane from Lima or 24 hours by bus. Fedus is not a member of the Seventh Day Adventist denomination. He fell in with them by chance in the third of his many "vacations."

He said he was drawn to them by the humanitarian acts they perform "without any ballyhoo or fanfare."

"They are sincere people who don't like to 'frills,'" he said, and they steer clear of politics.

All this fits Fedus to a tee. The result has been a strong friendship and admiration on both sides. The missionaries look forward to Fedus' arrival, and the "special" projects begin. Usually it starts with Fedus overhauling the mechanical equipment on the air base. Then he moves on to whatever else needs to be done.

THIS YEAR, ONE of the requests was for 28 chairs for the school the missionary group hopes to establish.

"There were 10 pieces to each chair," Fedus smiled in between puffs on an over-ripe pipe. "For a while there, it looked like an American production line." He did all the work himself except for an occasional hand from some native boys.

The missionaries aren't the only ones who are glad to see Fedus come. The Indians — who have nicknamed him "Dolpho" — are just as glad.

In fact, it doesn't take very long after the word comes down the river that the "giant in the red bandana" has arrived before plans for a celebration begin.

It probably should be noted here that one of Fedus' personal trademarks is the black wool beret he wears at all times — regardless of the occasion. For his trips to Peru, he wears it as far as Lima where he then stashes it and switches to a red bandana. He usually gives the bandana away before he leaves.

FEDUS OFTEN uses the celebration to pass out trinkets and gifts he collects in between visits and to perform feats of magic — like bending a set of iron bars. It's a ritual the natives have come to expect.

"They laugh," Fedus said, "and that's something you seldom see. But then, they don't have much to laugh about. It's a hard, lonely life."

The celebration this year had special significance for Fedus. It gave the opportunity for a reunion with an old-time friend — a cannibal chief whose son's life Fedus had a part in saving several years ago.

The youth was dying of a jungle malady, and Fedus arranged to have him flown to a nearby hospital. That incident has endeared him to many of the Indians who have heard the story and now regard him as a good friend.

Medical emergencies make a big part of his adventures, Fedus said. While the missionaries do most of the actual work, once in a while he is called upon to help. One of these times came when the missionary team was operating a floating medical clinic, visiting

the tiny riverfront villages. Their main purpose this trip was extracting teeth.

ON THE EXPEDITIONS, Fedus usually piloted the craft. But one of the trips he was pressed into service unexpectedly when the doctor was unable to continue with the extractions because of a severe arthritic attack.

"His wife told me I better watch her because I was going to have to take over," he recalled.

"I wound up pulling 15 teeth," he said.

What brought him to Peru in the first place, he said, was an account in Holiday magazine back in 1956 that told of American Henry Meigs' struggle with the construction of the TransAndean railroad in which 1,000 lives were lost. The sheer thought of a trip that begins at sea level and goes to 18,000 feet in the space of 85 miles was intriguing.

"I decided to go to see it," said Fedus. And two decades "it's still the most fascinating trip I know" because of its ruggedness and beauty, not to mention the dangers. The trip by bus is also considerably shorter, he noted. Where it once took 2 1/2 days to cover the 500 miles, it now takes 24 hours.

Fedus travels light in the clothing department for his month's stay in the warm, humid villages that dot the Amazon and where chiggers can make life unbearable. He prefers to use his air space allotment for tools and costume jewelry (this trip it was 50 pounds). Before teaming up with the missionaries, he used to bring over-the-counter medicine donated by a doctor/friend. He quit because the medical teams have a good source of their own.

This trip the missionaries used his special expertise in gardening and asked him to create a garden area for them.

THE REQUEST came from Dale and Pat Derksen, who operate a small medical clinic about 180 miles from Pucallpa.

The 74-year-old Fedus managed to clear a path in the dense forest and established two raised garden areas 30 by 4 feet where the Derksens will attempt to raise some vegetables in an ongoing effort to be self-sufficient. That's if the river cooperates and doesn't flood too much. This year, for instance, Fedus said the river raised six feet in one night.

The weather is bad enough but now politics, he said, are worse for the Peruvians and the people trying to help them.

"No one knows from one day to the next what's going to happen," he said. "Now the president is in and the military junta is out. It's played havoc with such institutions as the Amazonas Hospital that once was the South American Albert Schweitzer Hospital. It now is under the control of the government, and the result is that there are no government doctors in the jungle while 4,000 of them all die in Lima."

"Apparently they feel it is too lonely and there's no reward or no money," he continued.

The gap is being filled by the various missionary groups who are in the country.
