Four anti-Ku Klux Klan protesters were arrested by Southfield police Saturday in a KKK demonstration outside WXYZ-TV,

'The four were charged with assault and battery and resisting and obstructing police officers. They were released as \$100 bonds pending arraignment on the charges.

Imperial Wizard Bill Wilkinson and three of his white-robed followers were picketing the TV station, 10 Mile and Northwestern, to protest the cancellation of a Jan. 14 televised debate between Wilkenson and former Black Panther leader Bobby Seale.

The debate was scheduled for the "Kelly & Co." morning show.
Those arrested were among a group of 20-25 persons who rushed police lines set up to protect the Klansmen.
Wilkenson and his followers were exceptable.

They also were pelted with rocks and eggs by members of the International Committee Against Racism, police said. Three police officers were hurt during a brief scuffle, which started at 1:10 p.m.

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Other persons driving in cars ahouted obscendites at the Klansmen. One protester placed a sign across the street that read "Nuke the Klan."
A dozen members of the Civic Citizens of Southfield-Lathrup Villages stood 10 feet away to peacefully protest, said member Eric Coleman.
Three members of the S.S. Action Group of the National Socialist Party (the Michigan branch of the Nation-ganization) showed up after the protest, police said. They left when they were told the police had left.


Deadman. The federal money may be used for "any legal governmental purpose," he said.
