Cable firm wires up for local debut

As Farmington's Chatham Hills residents are preparing to turn on cable TV, MetroVision of Oakland County is moving its construction crews into parts of Farmington Hills and Novi. Although Chatham Hills already is wired for cable, it will be a few more weeks before residents can actually pull up their favorite chair and turn on the tube, said Tom Bjorklund, MetroVision's general manager.

Construction crews are fanning out

in a u-shaped pattern, starting in northwest Farmington Hills and working toward the southeast section of the city. Construction crews simultaneously are working in the third city in the tri-city cable-TV consortium.

"We're speeding up construction now," Bjorklund said. "We expect construction to be done by the end of 1983."

Bjorklund was unable to specify the exact number of households that have requested cable TV but guessed that about 70 percent of the Chatham Hills residents are subscribing.

Of those requesting cable TV, he said, most are signing up for the cable firm's Tier III level of service for \$7.25 per month. Tier III offers 56 channels including the Detroit commercial stations, and religious, educational, movie and public access channels.

RESIDENTS ALSO have the option of subscribing to other special movie channels, such as Home Box Office, Cinemas and Showtime, for an additional \$7.50 a month.

"The movie services are doing well," he said.

MetroVision's studio and offices at

37675 Enterprise, near Halsted south of 12 Mile, are complete, as is an 80-foot tower antenna for receiving local TV signals. Two satellite dish antennas designed to receive broadcasts from around the world, also are complete, Bjorklund said.

While construction crews are stringing and burying cable lines, they should not be entering homes or businesses. If someone represents himself as a cable company worker, and you're uncertain about his claim, ask the person to produce a photo ID card issued by the company, Bjorklund said.

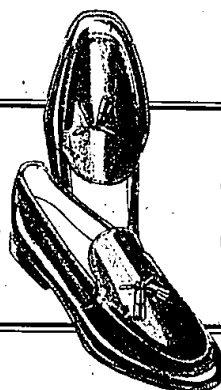
