Today, all synagogues have an ark, a sacred piece of furniture, to contain the scrolls of the Torab, the first five books of the Bible. "It is the most holy place in the synagogue," he said.
"Dating from the third century A.D., the ark forgenge comes from a millant.

"It bears remarkable similarity in "It bears remarkable almilarity in many of its component features as well as its overall composition to the ancient artistic depictions. As a structural remnant, it is an absolute unique and magnificent piece, a connector be-tween the Biblilical world and its Ju-deo-Christian successor."

In what Meyers called "a remarkable coincidence," Duke diggers at this same site during the previous 1980 season recovered several fragments of a black ceramic bowl showing a render-

ing of the Holy Ark. It was the first such depiction ever found on the medi-um of a ceramic vessel, Meyers said. While the bowl dates from the Byzan-tine era, or three centuries after the ark plece, it clearly showed a chain and lamp suspended under the gabled roof of the Torah Shrine.

MANY OF THE ANCIENT depletions of Torah Shrines feature rampant lions. Lions were a popular motif in the ancient Semitic and Aegean world and are deeply rooted in Jewish art and ar-

chitecture, where they are perhaps sug-gestive of the Biblical lions of Judah,

contecture, where they are persups sug-gestive of the Biblical Bloon of Judah, Meyers said.

Meyers said stop the ark's gable are distinctive, he said. They are realisti-cally modeled in high relief in a style more elegant and forceful than they conveyed by any of the ancient depic-tions of lions. They communicate pow-er and fecundity, excitement and high energy."
