When you hear tornado siren remember it's just a test

When you hear a tornado siren in the Farmington area today at 1 p.m., relax. It's just a test.

Even though tornado sirens in both Farmington and Farmington fills are tested the first Saturday of each month at 1 p.m., the siren test today is part of what Gov. James Blanchard has designated as Michigan Tornado Safety Weck (March 20-26).

Whenever residents hear the sirens, they are urged to avoid calling either city police department and instead tune to their television or radio for further information.

Tornado and severe weather sirens are citvated in the Farmington area by the National Weather Service or the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, serving as a back-up system.

Residents are reminded that when-

watch is issued, conditions are right for severe weather to develop. Watches are issued to give residents time to plan and prepare to take cover should the weather become serious. When a tornado or severe thunderstorm warning is issued, that means one or the other actually has been sighted or is strongly indicated by radar. A steady three-minute tone indicates a tornado has been sighted in the Parmington area and residents are to take shelter immediately.

Residents who want up-to-the minute weather condition reports may purchase weather alert monitors from most radio supply stores.


