He fights drunk drivers

positive way when he lectures about the effects of drunk driving.

Moran talked of the death of his 21-year-old brother, David. David was struck by a motorist in 1979 and died eight months later.

The man driving the car was not convicted of drunk driving, but Moran said he blamed his brother's death on alcohol.

"The roads were nasty, and he had been drinking and driving too fast," Moran said. "I feel if he had been going a safe speed and hadn't been drinking, the accident wouldn't have happened."

IN A SENTIMENTAL poem about his mother's grief for her dead son, Moran wrote, "See the lady all dressed in black, trying to bring a lost love back . . . The fight she has is a love hard one . . . all for the love of her departed son."

"After I read the poem to the kids in school, I ask them how they would feel

If they made someone feel this way," Moran said.

Moran and his mother, Joan, are both members of the Oakland County chapter of MADD.

"MADD isn't a group trying to reestablish prohibition," Moran said. "It's just people wanting drivers to use their God-given senses and not drive when they've been drinking."

MADD HAS LED drives for stricter drunk driving laws across the country. The Oakland County chapter, only a year old, is backed by Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson; Oakland County Sheriff Johannes Spreen; and Traffic Improvement Association Managing Director Bruce Madsen.

Moran cites statistics on drunk driving casualties and injured victims during his lectures.

"I challenge groups that I speak to to check out nursing homes, grave yards and hospitals, to see that what I'm telling them is true," he said.
