is registering patrons for new comput-er library cards. Patrons can stop in at either the Hills or the Farmington Branch to fill out an application form.

As soon as the new automated circulation system is in operation, patrons will need their new card to check out materials. There are separate adult and juvenile applications.

The Farmington Community Library, in cooperation with the Wayne-Oakland Library Federation, will soon use a computer to check out library materials to patrons. The new computerized circulation system will link the library's card catalog with other libraries in Wayne and Oakland counties, making more than two million materials available to residents. Sharing the cost of the central computer enables

PATRONS OF the Farmington Community Library who are residents of communities in the Wayne-Oakland System whose libraries are automating should register in their bonne communities. These libraries include Avon, Canton, Dearborn Heights, Inkiter, Livonia, Milford, Plymouth, Southfield, Walled Lake, Waterford and West Bloomfield. However, patrons from Livonia can register for their computer card at the Farmington Community Library.

Each library material will be as-signed to a bar code label (similar to those used on grocery store products) and each library card will have a bar

code label. When an item is borrowed, the computer scans the library card and the item and links them together in the computer. When materials are retained to the computer when materials are record of the check-out transaction and thereby protecting your privacy. Benefits of this system include greater speed and accuracy in the circulation process. The new system will permit renewal of books by telephone and will also send reserve and overdue notices, saving staff time. Delinquent patrons will be blocked at any library using the system.


