Kiwifruit is nutritious

I enjoyed watching you cook on Kelly & Co. I sent for the recipes you demonstrated and can't wait to try them. Could you tell me more about the fruit you used to decorate the cake. I think you called it kiwi.

The fuzzy-skinned fruit is called kiwifruit. Sometimes called Chinese gooseberry, this delicious versatile fruit tastes like a cross between a watermelon and a strawberry.

The average kiwifruit about the size of a lemon has only 52 calories and twice the vitamin C of an orange. This delightful, bright-green-meat fruit is easy to eat and enjoy. Peel away the fuzzy, brown skin and slice to eat raw or cooked. It's the perfect garnish for tarts, pies and cakes. It also adds color and flavor to fruit salads and picks up the low-calorie cottage cheese luncheon or open-faced sandwich. And it gives poultry and pork dinners a gourmet quality.
When buying kiwifruit choose firm fruit that is bluish-free. Ripen at room temperature for two or three days or in the refrigerator for one or two weeks.
Kiwifruit costs about 39 to 59 cents each and is available in the produce section of most area markets.
