The competitions include: "Science Bowl," a question-and-answer contest; the "Paper Airplane Flight," a homemade aircraft race judged on distance and speed; the "Tea-Making Contest," an event that challenges students to brew tea using solar energy; "Name that Organism;" and "Fermi Questions" like "How many drops of water in Lake Erie?"
