accepted a wage freeze for the coming year in return for assurances that four of their members will not be laid off.

Teamsters Local 214 late Monday af-ternoon has prompted a new proposal. If the four other city, unloss agree to forgo a contracted 7 percent wage in-crease for the coming year, their jobs could be saved as well.

Mainly, the group was concerned

about saving their jobs and those of their fellow workers," said Eugene Folk, union steward for Local 214.

LOCAL 214 represents the Depart-tent of Public Services, which is made ment of Public Services, which is made up of the recently merged departments of public works and parks and recre-

ation.

Prior to the agreement with the city, it was proposed that public services would lose one park maintenance position, one chipper operator position, two laborer positions and a DPW superintendent positions the reduction of two full-time positions to half time was also proposed.

Two retirements in the department reduced the number of positions to be lost to four.

Folk said that the union voted 26-12 in favor of the new one-year contract

in favor of the new one-year contract with the city at a meeting held at the public services building.

THE CITY COMMISSION went into THE CITY COMMISSION went into a closed session following its regular meeting Monday night to discuss the Teamster's vote. They resumed an open meeting 20 minutes later to announce the agreement.

"Perhaps this can be a guide to other unions," said Commissioner Gary Kain.

He proposed circulating a copy of the agreement to other city unions in the hope that they, too, would consider a

hope that they, too, would consider a wage freeze.

City Manager Robert Kenning said that if other city unions decided to accept a wage freeze, it would offset the expected deficit and make lay-offs unnecessary.

At present, the wages and benefits paid to Birmingham's 190 employees amount to roughly 80 percent of the city's \$10 million budget.

THE ACTUAL amount of the deficit which the city faces for the upcoming year is approximately \$900,000. That figure would be reduced to \$\$21,000 it he city moves ahead with a plan to increase list sat levy by 4.3 percent. The 4.3 percent figure was chosen because it is equal to the increase in the average cost of living for 1922 over the average for 1931.

Besides the wage freeze and the as-surances of jobs through June 30, 1948, the new Teanisters contract provides a number of options in the event that other city unions receive raises and ei-ther retain jobs or lose them. The con-tract also provides for increased denial coverage.
