Selections range from embellished hand-woven apparel to hand-painted and screened body coverings in cottons, silks and velvets. Extraordinary

needlework, quilting, beading, xerography and appliques adorn many of the garments.

Employment of various dying methods, including ikat, batik, resist, dye dispersal and air brush provide a richness of hue ranging from earthtones to bright colors. Whimsical touches are discovered in the use of rubber-
