## Better fishing, best wildflowers due in Oakland

Whether your idea of nature is fish or wildflowers, now is your time of year. In some spots, anglers are already active, and the best wildflower season of

tive, and the best wildflower season of the year is fast approaching. Pontiac Lake has been restocked with 27,000 gamelish from four inches to 15 pounds in heft, according to Ren Spitler, Department of Natural Re-sources district fish biologist. Pontiac also received 800,000 north-ern pike fry and 1,800 pounds of min-nows. Expect good fishing by late sum-mer.

white you're waiting for the game-fish to grow up, try Poulise for perch and suntish which survived the tragic die-off of 1982. They grow wildly last summer and provided some good an-gling by last fail.

Pontiac's water level, you'll recall, was drawn down for emergency dam repairs a year ago. Severe oxygen depletion under the ice resulted in the fish kill.

Lakeville, a 460-acre lake in north-east Oakland County, should produce good panfishing this summer after the 1982 fish-thining project, Spiter said. Thousands of stunted panfish were poi-soned. Only one was found as long as seven inches. Some 8,000 pounds of big

carp were killed off, too.
A fail survey at Lakeville showed the average size of bluegill had grown a full inch since the toxification project in May.
At Tipaico Lake in northwest Oakland County, look for good numbers of catchable bass this summer and perhaps some keeper miskies (30 inches) by late summer. Bluegills and crapples should be good this year, too.
Tipaico was treated for total fish removal in 1980-81 and restocked. Surveys in summer of 1982 showed excel-

lent largemouth bass and muskle populations, Spitler said.
Other Oakland lakes which received plantings in recent weeks are Union, Maceday, Deer and Dickinson.

## OU offering night credits


Oakland University will offer credit courses during the evenings eginning Tuesday, May 3, in several communities including Bir-ungham and West Bloomfield.
