

Mathews hurls 1-hitter to pace Southfield '9'

Southfield High pitching standout Craig Mathews fired a one-hitter past Ferndale Monday as the Blue Jays belted Southeastern Michigan Association rival Ferndale, 10-0. Mathews (2-0), the only Blue Jay pitcher, who's earned victories this year, fanned 11 Eagle batters en route to the win.

"He had a good fastball, and a good curve," Southfield coach Cliff D'Amico said. "Hitters were way behind on his fastball, and he had them lunging on the curve ball."

Mike Burwell had a double and a home run to pace Southfield's seven-hit attack. Bob Graham and Mathews each had two hits.

Saturday, Southfield (2-5) lost to

Bloomfield Hills Lahser twice by one run in the bottom of the seventh inning. Each time, an RBI single felled the Blue Jays.

Lahser won the first game, 2-1, and then the nightcap, 7-4. Graham had two hits in the second game, and Scott Sterling had two.

SOUTHFIELD-LATHRUP swept both ends of a non-league double-header from Berkley Saturday, as the Chargers posted victories of 8-3, and 8-3.

Scott Kline was the winning pitcher in the first game, as he did not allow an earned run. Kline allowed four hits, two walks and he fanned four batters.

Catcher Randy Carey had two hits and drove in three runs for the Chargers (2-1).

In the second game, pitcher Pete Ammon worked five innings, allowed two hits, one earned run, walked five and struck out seven as he notched the win.

Designated hitter Jeff Tabelling had two-hits and three runs batted in, while teammate Al Ghosh had two hits and one RBI.

SOUTHFIELD CHRISTIAN'S Andy McCulloch threw a two-hit shutout Tuesday afternoon as the Eagles topped Warren Baptist, 3-0. McCulloch went the distance, struck

out six and walked two.

Kent Neat picked up the only two hits for Southfield Christian and had one of the runs batted in. Tommy Burk knocked in the other run on a ground out.

Monday, the Eagles (2-3) lost to Riverdale, 7-5.

Burk had a productive day for the Eagles as he had two hits and three stolen bases. Chris Seavey — the losing pitcher — and McCulloch each had hits for Southfield Christian.

Friday, Christian plays Grosse Pointe University-Liggett.

The Cranes won all eight flights — four singles and four doubles — and scored 32 points. Detroit Country Day was second with 12 points, followed by Edsel Ford with nine and Northville with three.

Freshman Ray Ashare won the No. 1 singles title over DCD's Chris Jones, 6-2, 6-0. Senior co-captain Keith King defeated Yellow Jacket Nicolas Ferding at No. 3 singles, 6-1, 6-7, 6-3, and John Solik won the No. 4 singles crown over DCD's Jim London, 6-1, 6-2.

The No. 2 singles title was won by Cranbrook freshman David Drew.

In doubles, the No. 1 team of Brian Hagenlocker and Greg Kain won in straight sets. The No. 2 squad of Kurt Koblick and David Janner defeated DCD's tandem of Raamin Kashel and Ashish Prasad, 6-1, 6-1.

Senior co-captain Charlie Moore and David Weir combined for the No. 3 doubles title over Kevin Davis and Mark Kadus of DCD, 6-1, 6-1. The No. 4 medal went to John Sotiroff and Mitch Foster.

COUNTRY DAY whipped Rochester Adams in a dual meet on Monday, 7-0.

DCD's singles winners were Chris Jones, Cam Farrah, Jim London and Rob Nagle.

The pack of runners began the race promptly at 12:30 p.m., heading out on a 13.1-mile jaunt that would take them through new subdivisions and old woods, over blacktop and concrete, dirt and grass in streets and on bicycle paths, past lakes and a golf course, through new West Bloomfield and old.

The race began quietly, seriously, with none of the cheering and gaiety that accompany the start of a 10-kilometer race. The atmosphere was business-like. The distance was too long and the conditions too tough to waste any energy.

By the four-mile mark, on Farmington, the pack had thinned to an orderly, single-file line. By the aid station at eight miles, the hills and woods were taking their toll. Runners slowed perceptibly; stopped to drink, walked on inclines.

At 10 1/4 miles, the course turned onto Walnut Lake for its longest straightaway, two unrelenting miles dead into the wind. More walkers. Grim determination on everyone's face. Not much fun, now.

Finally, the 18-mile marker. Speed pick up. Smiles return. One last left and the race is over.

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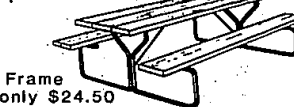


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
