## Free testting attracts thousands

ORE THAN 3,000 health-conscious visitors to the Livonia Mail lined up last week for tests to tell them how their The codies were doing. More than 60 volunters, supplementing health professionals, helped carry out the testing program.

"The lines were long, but everything went very well. The volunteers did a tremendous job and so did the security staff," said Mary McDonell, marketing director for the mall.

Visitors came from throughout the area to take advantage of the testing program. And although lines were long, people were patient, said McDonell, who guided an 85-year-old woman to the front of the line.

"She was waiting patiently, but I thought at that age she deserved to be moved up (to the front of line), and no en objected."

Testing took 20 minutes and included height,

weight, blood pressure, anemia, vision and glauco-ma and teeth. Those tests were free, and they also could pay 17 for additional tests for blood chemis-try, diabetes, liver and bone disease. All the tests were aimed at detecting problems in early stages when treatment is likely to be success-ful. Those tested furnished names of family physi-cians to whom results were to be sent.

In addition to the tests, the event featured a large display of pamphiets and informational brochures on cancer, heart disease and other physical problems.
