EXACTLY HOW these ideas are depicted in the music is hard to determine from first listening, but the music does seem to portray some good orchestration and writing that is, at least, acceptable.

While it doesn't come off as an exceptionally profound plece, I am inclined to suspend judgment for the time being. The composer himself went on stage to receive the applause.

Bablini, of course, is known to our audiences not just for his position as a principal ceilist with our orchestra, but through his many appearances here in chamber music events, in which he has demonstrated time and again his keen musical sibility.

some inconsistencies and clashes be-tween the orchestral sections. But there were many rewarding moments as well, with some crafffully phrased and articulated passages. Bablai wrote his own cadenzas, and the one in the first movement, which was about half as long as the move-ment itself, impressively captured and juxtapositioned the various themes of the movement. The middle movement was very impressive.

THE MOST rewarding piece on the program was the De Falla composition. It featured mezzo sornon Barbra Windham, who didn't fail to capture the audience in splite of her very brief role. Kost themes in that composition are very popular and familiar through the abbreviated suite version. Irenically, one of the less familiar aspects is a brief parody based on another popular

theme, that of Beethoven's Fifth Sym-

theme, tax of occurrence, Jean presented this ballet as a cohesive, meaningful work. He had complete command and control, producing a coloral spectrum of sounds.

There were many impressive solo passages, including impressive playing by Robert Williams, principal bassoon, whose role is prominent in this composition.

While this work is considered to be light music based on a light theme, it didn't sound like an inconsequential piece. It portrayed De Falls as one of the glited composers of our century, which he truly was.

This week will mark the last pre-gram of the season, when Maestro-Gary Bertini will make his last appear-ance here in his capacity as music ad-visor.
