

Troy, Athens ring up soccer shutouts

Troy High recorded its ninth win and seventh shutout of the season Monday night when the Colts blanked Royal Oak Kimball, 8-0.

The Colts (9-1) picked up two first-half goals from Carol Grenn and one each from Liz Suttle and Carla Farwell to take a 4-0 lead.

Suttle scored her 18th goal of the season in the second half, and Grenn, Ericka Johnson and Lee McKinney added goals to close out the seventh.

Goalie Joanne Blake earned her scoring shutout.

Tonight, Troy is slated to play at Birmingham Seaholm.

TROY ATHENS, the No. 3-ranked team in the state, buries Royal Oak Dooder, 6-0, to run its record to 7-0-1.

Lori Nicley, Renee Eicholtz and Tricia Lally each scored first-half goals, while Kathy Collins, Teri Fabris and Nicley scored in the second half. Nicley and Eicholtz lead the Red Hawks with eight goals each on the year.

MICHIGAN COACH Rocky Watkins will take his team this weekend to Anderson, Ind., for another AAU tournament.

The team then will prepare to meet the Russian Junior National team Sunday, May 22, at Schoolcraft College.

"Right now I'm learning all of the personalities," Watkins said. "I believe Darryl Johnson and Garde Thompson (of East Grand Rapids) are our most fundamentally sound players."

"It's tough when you haven't had the practice. We had one on Wednesday, and seven showed up. That's a good turnout."

Watkins has high hopes for this summer when the Michigan AAU squad will play June 10-12 in the Boston Shoob-

out followed by a July 11-15 date at the AAU Junior Olympics in Jacksonville, Fla. Michigan last won the nationals in 1977, led by Magic Johnson.

"THIS IS the best balanced team we've ever had," Watkins said. "This year's group is just tremendous."

But a closer look at this year's roster suggests that Michigan is overloaded with guards. Malecki and Smith are the team's only true post players.

That could spell trouble against a big, strong and physical team like the Russians.

"We'll have to establish some roles," said Watkins after Saturday's game. "A guy like Garde Thompson may have to take over for us at the point."

"And a guy like Kevin Smith will be more effective when he gets the ball."
