

Missionary To Congo Heads Baptist Meetings

The Westland Baptist Church of Livonia, 3375 Arbor Trail, will hold its second annual missionary conference from Saturday, May 2, through Sunday, May 10.

Themes for the eight-day conference will be "Light for a Dark World." Missionary messages, films, colored slides, exhibits, panel discussions and field reports are planned.

The Rev. Richard Sanford, eastern representative of the New Tribes Mission, will be the principal speaker. Many of the pictures and films will show what he obtained during the time he spent among four Indian tribes nearly 2,000 miles back in the Amazon River jungles of Brazil.

He has also been among primitive tribes in Panama and Bolivia. Information will be given as to how danger and hardships are overcome in taking the teaching of the Bible to men who still live as savages in this modern age.

Also ministering during the conference will be the Rev. Ray Melton, working in Brazil with New Tribes Mission; the Rev. and Mrs. William Batistich, missionaries in the Congo with the Conservative Baptist Foreign Missionary Society and Paul, Pat and Dorothy Dye, working in Venezuela with New Tribes Mission.

The conference will begin with a family potluck supper at 6 p.m. Saturday, May 2. The missionaries will be introduced and interviewed.

Both Sundays, May 3 and May 10 there will be conference sessions at 9:45 and 11 a.m. and 6 and 7 p.m. The missionaries will speak at all meetings.

Monday through Friday of next week there will be meetings at 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. Reports from several different world areas, slides of the work, and discussion groups

will be interspersed with messages. Highlights of the week will include Women's luncheon at 12 noon on Wednesday, a "Men for Missions" breakfast at 7:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 9, and a Youth Banquet at 6:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 9.

Several youth and adult groups have been preparing exhibits and posters for some time and these will be on display throughout the conference.

"The public is cordially invited to attend any of the sessions," said the Rev. Edward H. Deville, Westland Baptist pastor. "We need to be awakened to our responsibilities as Christians in these dark days."

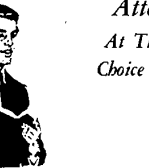

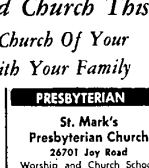

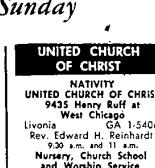
