KANDT SAID she hopes the state government "will trim up a bit" as a

result of the proposals she supports.

"I think we have too much government," she said. "I have a little plague in my kitchen. It says: 'Thank God we're not getting all the government we're paying for.'"

"I'm in politics and I have that in my kitchen. I mean, I should be saying, 'Pay more! Pay more! But I don't feel that way.'"

"I'm in politics because I want to see what's going on. I'm in politics because I want to fight for the rights of the people."

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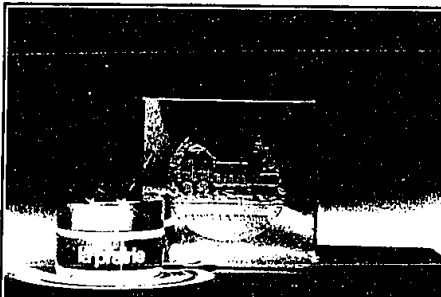


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
