SATURDAY, MAY 14

- e One of the oldest events in Michigan Week, the YMCA-sponsored Fishing Derby at Quarton Lake will be held from 8:30-10:30 a.m. for children 14 years and younger. Registration will be at the park on the east side of the lake. Prizes for the biggest and smallest fish will be given. Bring your own equipment. But will be furnished. Parents should ccompany younger children.
- A pancake breakfast at St. Jomes Episcopal Church will be held from 9-11 a.m. Sponzered by Common Ground, the cost will be \$2.50 for adults and \$1.75 for children under 12. The country-style breakfast includes paneakes, bacon, milk, orange drink and coffee.
- Mayfair, an art fair sponsored by the Birmingham Bloomfield Art Association, will be held in Shain Park from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. It will feature 100 artists and include work in many different media: acrylic, all, water color, jewelry, ceramics, fibers, glass, metal, clothing and charcoal sketches. Food concessions will be set up, which will provide an emphasis on gournet food as well as the traditional hot dog fare. - A parade sponsored by the Birmingham-Bloom-field Jaycees will begin at 11 a.m at the foot of Woodward and Harmon, proceed from Woodward to Maple and end in Shain Park. Approximately 50 groups and 1,000 people will participate. The parade will feature the First Michigan Colonial Fife &

Drum Band, Celtic Pipe & Drum Band, Seaho and Groves High school bands, Troy Athens Band, Blue Water Buccaneers, Jumbo the mechanical elephont and numerous clowns and floats. The grand marshall of the parade will be sculptor Marshall Fredericks. The Birmingham Newcomers will host a post-parade reception for participants. The Jaycees will provide continuous entertainment in the bandshell at Shain Park following the parade.
