THE PROPOSED millage increase can be broken down into two components: a 395-mill increase in operating millage and a 56-mill increase in the debt service millage. That translates into an operating millage increase from the existing 10.105 to 10.50 and a debt service millage increase from the current. 68-mill to 1.24 mills.

The proposed increase in the debt service millage is due to the city's two planned drain projects: the Caddell Drain Project and another in a 58-acre parcel southwest of Farmington Road and Grand River. The debt service millage would be used to increase the funding for bonds that will be issued to pay for the two projects, Deadman said.

likely in light of the projected in-creased costs of doing business and a contract of the contract of the costs of the said city officials have maintained a fairly stable cax rate succe the late 1970s — between 10 and 12 mills — because property assessments in Farmington have increased. The rec-ommended millage cree for 1983-84 is still lower than the 11.5 mills levied in 1979-80, he added.

But this year there has been an al-most 2-percent drop in "community-wide" assessed value and an average 4-percent drop in residence. I property.

So while faced with anticipated in-creased expenditures in 1983-84, the decrease in total SEV gives the city fewer dollars for each mill levied, he

Because a local tax increase alone is insufficient to offset the city's projected financial pinch, eity officials also are recommending using about \$147,000 in reserve funds to help balance the 1983-84 \$4.8 million budget. City officials also suggest using the expected \$55,200 in 1983-84 federal shared revenues to offset the costs of salaries for public safety officers.
