## Violin virtuoso in concert

Harold Dalich, chairman of the Weisberg Concert, has announced that violin virtuoso Joseph Silverstein will be featured artist at the annual Peter and Clara Weisberg Concert at 8 p.m. Tuesday, June 6, in Congregation Shaarey Zedek.

Silverstein is internationally known as a concert violinist. He is first violinist of Boston Symphony Orchestra, and a teacher. Critics have acclaimed his precisely focused, total technical command, and refinement.

Born in Detroit, he began his musical studies at age three with his father, Ben Silverstein, and later attended the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia. Among his teachers were Joseph Gingold, Mischa Mischakoff, and Efrem Zimbalist. In 1959, he was a winner of the prestigious Queen Elizabeth of Belgium International Competition and, in 1960 he won the Walter W. Naumburg Award. Silverstein has appeared as soloist with the orchestra of Denver, Detroit, Los Angeles, New York, Indianapolis, Milwaukee, Philadelphia and Rochester in this country, and abroad in Geneva, Jerusalem and Brussels.

HE HAS given master classes with Seiji Ozawa in China. He appears regu-

larly as soloist with the Boston Symphony and conducts the orchestra frequently in Symphony Hall and at Carnegie. He has also conducted the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Rochester Philharmonic, Jerusalem Symphony, National Symphony and the St. Louis Symphony.

Recently, he donated his time to conduct and play a fund-raising concert with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra at Orchestra Hall. He has participated with the Chamber Players in recordings for RCA and has recently recorded Vivaldi's "Four Seasons" and Rimsky-Korsakov's "Scheherazade" with the Boston Symphony Orchestra.

The concert is open to the entire community at no charge. Tickets may be obtained by sending in a written request and a stamped, addressed envelope to Congregation Shaarey Zedek.

Patron tickets at \$25 each are available and will entitle patrons to reserved seating plus admission to a reception following the concert where they will meet the artist.

The concert is sponsored under the aegis of Shaarey Zedek Cultural Commission, Dr. Samuel Stulberg and I. Murray Jacobs, co-chairmen.
