still has the cream of the crop if you rate by individual talkin. Last Sunday, I ran across a team of future Olympians at the Atlanta airport — the Russian Junior National squad. They will be here to take or the Michigan Aul squad at 8 pm. Sunday at Schoolcraft College in Livonia. The Russian juniors started their U.S. tour May 10 in New York and will flinish the 11-game swing Wednesday in Boston.

BECAUSE OF A U.S. boycott, the Soviets last visited Schoolcraft in 1980. In 1976, they put on a clinic against a Michigan squad that boasted Joe Kopicki, Trent Tucker and Walker D. Russell. Taking advantage of the rough and tumble international style of play, the Russian juniors literally beat up the Michigan stars and won handly.

I didn't need a tape measure at the terminal to see how physically imposing these lads are. A roster sent to me earlier this week confirmed what I had already suspected — a pair of 6-11s, two 6-10s, a 5-6, two 6-8s and two 6-65s (small forwards). And don't forget 7-foot alternate Aleksandr (Mohotikov.

But don't frett. Michigan has the Antoine (The Judge) Joubert to launch his 25-foot jumpers. He'll need a 20-for-20 showing to keep the score close. The problem with this year's Michigan team is that they really can't match up inside against the Soviets.

AFTER WATCHING the Michigan AAU team two weeks ago, it appears Redford Catholic Central's Mike Malecke at 4.7 is the only true port player. But he won't play Sunday because of graduation exercises. "I'm not afraid of the Russians. They have to stoom jump abooters, and I hink our guys will be 'geeked up' to play. Defense is the key, though."
