State Rep. Wilfred Webb, a man who chooses his words carefully, confessed he was "in a state of shock" last week when university presidents told thirt they plan to increase student tutilion.

The increases are coming despite Gov. James Blanchard's now budget, which advocates 9 percent more money for the major universities and 7.5 percent more for smaller college.

"It had hoped we could hold the line—or even get reductions," said Webb, D-Hazel Park. "That certainly is going to be a goal of mine."

Webb, 62, was an educator for 35 years before his successful venture into politics. He won a special election to fill's House vecancy in mild 1982 and re-election from a reapportioned district in November.

tially a freshman, he has drawn major committee
assignments of the sort rarely given to newcomers:
Chairman of the Colleges and Universities

** Chairman of the Colleges and Universities formulate.

** Vice chairman of the Education Committee, which deals with kindergarten-12th grade schools.

** Member of the Taxation Committee, which handled Blanchard's tax increase in March.

** Member of the Public Utilities Committee. In part, Webb's choice assignments were due to the defeat of veteran Rep. Leufile McCollough of Dearborn, who held the Colleges and Education posts. In larger part, say Democratic leaders, they are due to Webb's own abilities.

HOUSE Speaker Gary Owen, D-Ypsilanti, said Webb drew such major committee posts, including a chairmanship, because 'we're fortunate to have PhDa with his kind of experience locally and his understanding of the school lax structure.

"We've had only one other person with that kind of experience since I've been in the House — Cliff Snfart, the assistant Republican leader from Walled Lake."

The legislative race was Webb's second try for public office. In 1974, he sought the Democratic nomination for Congress but was defeated by a 32-year-old assistant attorney general named Blancherd.

ALTHOUGH HE has less than a year in office, Webb has much Lansing experience. After rettring from the Hazel Park School District, he worked six years as a consultant to the Senate Fiscal Agency, researching such questions as the school aid formula and funding of special education. "That was a pretty good retirement job. I made more money than I do now, and I didn't work as hard," he said with a laugh. A 1941 graduate of Alma College, Webb taugh that for live years, was a counselor four years, a principal four years, an assistant superintendent four years and superintendent 19 year, all in Hazel Park. Along the way be earned his two advanced degrees at Wayne State University.

WEBB continues to worry about long-range college and school funding, particularly for middle-class suburbanites. The property tax is overburdened. State participation (in school funding) is down. There are inequities between districts, even in an area like Oakland County, he said.

Universities tell him that with a major dose of new state money, they could hold the line on tuition but won't hint at a tuition reduction. Instead, they suggest state grants to cover tuition for the needy.

"Even the better off are having trouble meeting tition," Web counters.

He doesn't foresee the state closing any colleges, although that is sometimes suggested in Lansing. "It's tough to close one. There will be some downsizing. There will be elimination of some duplications.
"It's easy to say lower tuition," but you can't but

manaste it. And mose colleges are autonomous. DESPITE his two education assignments, Webb insists. "The real power is in the Appropriations Committee. They have subcommittees on colleges and K-12."

But he says his committees have "excellent working relationships" with two key Appropriations subcommittee chairmen. — Democrats William Keith of Garden City and James O'Nelli of Saginaw.

liam Keith of Garden City and Jaines Oven. Or Saginaw. The taxation committee assignment, however, was one Webb didn't ask for and didn't relish. Its first order of business was raising the state income tax rate 1.75 percent.

"I don't think anyone expected it to turn out the way it did," he said, referring to nearly party-line votes in both chambers.

votes in both chambers.

THERE WERE discussions of allowing voters to substitute a sales tax for the income tax increase, of using a sales tax hike to achieve properly tax reduction, of a host of options.

But the discussions deadlocked over the question of the size of the deficit. "We (Democratis) were convinced we could have sat 'ill summer, and we couldn't have got off that deficit. The Republicans took the position, 'You Democratis are going to have to pass the tax package and lake the blame for it.' We knew that on a one-party we'd have to unite."


