

Walled Lake candidate claims newsletter unfair

A Walled Lake school board candidate has charged a district employee with violating board policy by endorsing one of the candidate's opponents in a school newsletter.

Samuel Wolfe, one of four candidates for two spots on the board, charged last week that the secretary at Oakley Park Elementary School violated board poli-

cy by endorsing the candidacy of Cynthia Campton through a newsletter sent to the parents of Oakley Park students.

The charges were labeled "poppycock" by Campton, who said the school secretary, Beverly Anderson, merely was citing Campton for 11 years of service to the children of the district.

"At no time did she come out and say 'Vote for Cynthia Campton,'" Campton said. "She merely was thanking me for my 11 years of service to the schools."

THE ITEM WHICH has created the stir appeared in Oakley Park's April newsletter under the heading "Extra Terrific News."

Anderson said in the item that she is "proud to announce that Cynthia Campton, one of our most active PTA members, past PTA president, is running for a seat on the board of education."

Anderson also stated that she has known Campton for many years. "She is always available to help at

school doing whatever needs to be done," Anderson said in the item.

Wolfe told the school board Monday that the comment in the newsletter violates board policy §125 which states that the school policy "prohibits any political information from being distributed to students to take home if it endorses a candidate or attempts to influence the reader with respect to a given issue."

Board President Robert Cooper refused to take action on Wolfe's request. He said the matter will be re-

ferred to Superintendent Don Sheldon for appropriate action.

In response to Wolfe's request for equal time for the other candidates, Cooper said two wrongs don't make a right.

"The problem is not associated with the other candidate; it's associated with an employee breaking policy," he said.

Wolfe and Campton are two of the four candidates for a pair of four-year terms on the board in the June 13 election. The other candidates are incumbent Janet Callahan and Kenneth Tucker, who served on the board, 1978-82.

District eyes change in way it reports on students

Walled Lake's school board voted unanimously last week to table action on a recommendation to revise elementary report cards designed by Elementary Education Director Hugh Davies.

There now is some confusion as to what type of report cards students will receive because of this board action.

Initially, it appeared the recommendation would be allowed to die with the

action whatsoever, but Superintendent Don Sheldon urged the board to discuss the matter further.

"WE'VE EXHAUSTED the supply of report cards we've used in the past, and we may be in a position of having no more report cards (if some action is not taken)," Sheldon said.

The board, however, dislikes the new

report-card style developed by Davies and an educational committee.

Davies said the new cards are the result of a two-year study that has included the feelings of both educators and parents.

"Our existing report cards were introduced 16 years ago, and a lot of us, educators and parents, felt it was time for a change," Davies said. "The curri-

culum committee has done a study of teachers and the community and is now recommending these changes."

Trustee Merlin Reeds led opposition to the recommended changes. He said the existing cards need changing desperately, but that the proposed cards are no improvement.

"Communication with parents about their children's progress is very important," Reeds said. "The proposed card is not a good communication tool."

years with baited breath" for new report cards, but was disappointed with the proposed change.

"Parents are looking for simplified report cards; these are not simplified," she said.

Jackman called the revised cards "complicated and confusing" and said she did not believe they would be accepted by the parents.

Davies asked that his committee be permitted to make a presentation about the philosophies behind the new cards, but the request was turned down by the board. Instead, the board asked for a written report and tabled the matter for further study.

She is founder and director of New Sources, a network of women; founded and directed the Fish program in Inlay City.
