Over house payments

TV personalities involved in lawsuit

A 65-year-old West Bloomfield civic leader is suing two prominent TV personalities for monthy, land-contract payments she says are due on the house she sold them 4% years ago.

Janet Lynn claims John Kelly and Marilyn Turner, also of West Bloomfield, are three months in arrears on payments totalling \$7,950.

The Kellys are asking for a jury trial because they claim Lynn is holding \$4,440 in an escrow-tax account, which could be applied to their house payment.

Juge Bernard Friedman, 48th Dis-trict Court, adjourned Friday's pretrial hearing for one week to give both par-ties a chance to settle the dispute. The Kellys said they paid \$5,988 last December for taxes, in answering Lynn's complaint. Lynn said that mon-ey is held in serrow for July and De-cember 1983 taxes. In the Kellys' counterclaim, they al-ledged they paid in advance into the es-crow account. They charged harrass-ment because their legal and court

costs amount to \$2,000 in this case
