Prepared childbirth classes begin June, July

Classes in Prepared Childbirth are being offered by the Larnaze Childbirth Education Association of Livonia at various locations throughout the Livo-nia-Farmington-Novi areas for June

nia-Farmington-Novi areas so and July.

The classes are taught by a Lamaze-trained registered nurse who has had at least one baby. They cover information on pregnancy, labor and delivery, breathing techniques and relaxation exercises, hospital procedures, breastfeeding information, newborn care, Caesarean childbirth procedures, medications, and postpartum recovery and include two childbirth films.

the parents for the birth of their child through knowledge and to give them skills to use during labor and delivery to alleviate fear and tension.

"Although we do not lead parents to expect a 'painless labor,' nor one necessarily conducted without analgesia, anesthesia or episiotomy, it has been our experience that prepared patients usually require less medication," said Elaine Foster, speaking for the group.

"By presenting the many childbirth alternatives available to the expectant mother, we hope to encourage discussion with her doctor and participation in the decision-making process before

the delivery situation arrives, thus en-abling each couple to have a satisfying, dignified and cooperative birth experi-ence to be always remembered as warm and gratifying event," she said.
