Environmentally ill may have a variety of acute symptoms

Q. What is environmental illness?

A. Environmental illness is a term used to encompass a broad range of ailments that manifest a wide variety of physical and mental symptoms that can affect virtually any tissue, organ or system in the body. Asthma, headache, arthritis, stomach pain, irritability, depression and even hyperactivity although often easily diagnosed can present problems when trying to determine their cause.

People who are environmentally ill are unable to adapt to one or more elements in their environment whether natural or synthetic. They may develop a variety of chronic or acute symptoms that are brought on by substances in the air we breathe, the food we eat, the

water we drink or the place in which we live.

Natural inhalants such as pollen, dust and molds, common food such as strawberries, for instance, often affect people adversely. This condition commonly known as allergies is complicated by the many synthetic chemicals that are now found in our environment. The overexposure to irritants can trigger sensitivity and disease even in those individuals with no history of allergy.

An organization to help people deal with the frustrations of environmental illness is the Human Ecology Action League of Michigan (HEAL). They provide information, promote research and offer support groups.
