State business climate survey called 'useless'

A top official of the nation's leading the selection consulting firm for business called a study that placed Michina at the bottom of the list in its business climate "simple-minded and usess."

William Shapiro, vice president of chicago-based Fantus Co., critized a report produced by Alexander rank & Co. for the Conference of State anufacturers Associations. That report listed Michigan 48 out of 48 states business climate.

Shapiro made his remarks at the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce conference in the Grand Hotel on Mackinac Island.
Of the Alexander Grant study, he said, "It think it's mainly a compendium of rather simplistic statistical rankings which have very little to do with the actual factors that contribute to, or hinder, economic growth."

SHAPIRO SAID, "Some of the crite-ria utilized in the study are outdated, many are irrelevant, and some are very ambiguous, so it's the old expres-sion, 'garbage in, garbage out." "Adding up a bunch of miscellaneous statistical rankings which find Michi-gan last really doesn't tell us much

about what the true issues affecting economic development in the Michigan area."

As an example, Shapiro cited the study's use of value added per production worker as an indicator of productivity. He said the figures were five years old and have "very little to do with what a manufacturer means by worker productivity when he's looking for a place to locate hay plant."

Shapiro said manufacturers are concerned about productivity factors such as how hard-working people are, how conscientious, flexible and versatile they are, and how well trained they are.

AS ANOTHER example, he said electric power costs for business can-not be measured by state, but rather should be measured by utility-company service area. A company using 400,000 kilowatt

hours per month in one part of Michl-gan may have a monthly bill of \$12,000, while in another part of Michi-gan, the bill would average \$23,000, be

said.

Shapiro said such factors as proper-ty-tax abatement and educational and training facilities are pluses for Michi-gan's business climate, while Michigan ranks on the tough end of the spectrum

He said local economic development:
In extremely important, "Too much
emphasis is given the state business climate," Shapiro contended, "when often
the most important factor is the local;
business climate, how well the localcommunity can work with industry,
available sites and utility services and
amenities."


