Michael Harless, now 18, was tried for first-degree murder in the stabbing death last summer of Philip Howard, 18.

Gakiand County Circuit Judge Gene Schnelz, who beard the case without a jury April 20, found Harless not guilty by reason of insanity.

Harless currently is undergoing evaluation and treatment in the Center for Forensic Psychiatry in Ypsilanti, He's been in jail or hospitalized since the incident occurred last summer.

A determination must be made by Monday, June 20 — almost a year to

the day of Howard's death — whether Harless will continue to be hospitalized for treatment or released. He can never be jailed on the charge. Members of both families talked about the situation in interviews with The Observer earlier this week.

"I think about it every day," said Larry Howard, father of the victim, his soft voice occasionally breaking with emotion. "It gets a little easier every day, I don't feel any regrets to their family, What I think about every day is my son isn't here."

"I FEEL if he had died another way, it would be easier to accept," said June Howard, Philip's mother. "It's hard to aleep, Holiday are the worst."

"I wake up in the middle of the night thinking about it, "Howard added. "We're different now," Mrs. Howard aid, "We're trying to adjust. There are only three people in our family now instead of four."

Couple's search for granddaughter is now 24 years old and still going on

Sherry Lynn Howell would be 29 years old by now. That much her grandparents know. What they'd like to learn is a place or a name — something they could use to lind her.

"If we just had a name, we could search the records. Maybe we could find someone who had some information," said Sherry's grandmother, Sue Kalbassa.

Sherry's story — and that of her three brothers and sisters — began in October 1959. The four children and their mother lived in what is now the Norwayne area of Westland. Their father had moved to South Carolina, and their mother decided to place the children for adoption with the Children's Aid Society.

The two youngest children were adopted by the same family, and last October, the Kaibassas were reunited with them.

"We had registered with AIM (an organization that works to unite adoptes with their natural particular, and they (the grandchildren) had registered, too, said Kaibassa, who now lives in Romitus, "It took months for the computer to connect us up, but it did.

The reunion meant a spectacular Thansylving celebration for the Kaibassas, with 28 family member flying in from throughout the country.

The reunion has meant "total new life for the little ones," said Kaibassa. They found a whole new family,"
"We had a bail, but the sad part is that we couldn't find Sherry, 'Kaibassa added.

BUT THE Kalbassas haven't given up hope. In

fact, they think that Sherry, or someone she knew, may be living in or near Livonia.

"About I 70 18 years ago, I bumped into a lady in the mail who asked if I knew what had happened to Sherry. She said she had seen her and knew she was with a family in the Livonia area.

"But we had no name to go on, and courts wouldn't open the records," she said.
Renewing her search for Sherry, Kalbassa has written to Lansing to see if birth records there may list her grandaughter under a different name. Wyandotte records list only the name of Sherry's natural parents.

Kalbassa hopes that events recalled in this story "might jog the memory" of Sherry or someone who
