

### Auto rams tanker on Middlebelt

A Farmington couple, recent immi-grants from Romania who were driv-ing to an English class over rain-alleked roads Tuesday morning, are "lucky to be alive," in the words of a man who saw their 1974 Cadillac ram a

man who saw their 1974 Cadillac ram a gazoline taker truck on Middlebelt Road just north of Grand River. Constituit Grigorean and bis wife, Erzsebet, refused medical treatment after the accident, according to Farm-ington Hills police. No fire or explosion resulted from the crash. But the accident ended with the Ca-dillac's entire front end lodged under the tanker, bringing a "three-station" response from the fire department and drawing large numbers of police offi-cers.

Michael Currin of Detroit said he saw the accident while using a public telephone in a restaurant across Middlebelt.

"It hit so hard that it shook the inside of the restaurant," he said.

According to police, Grigorean's auto was traveling north on Middlebelt when it struck the empty tanker driven by Danny Kimmerre of Ponitac.

Having just delivered 9,000 gallons of gasoline to the Addison station at Middlebelt and Grand River, Kimmer-er was turning his rig onto Middlebelt from the station.

"I put on my brake when I saw the truck, but I was too near," said Grigorean, who estimated his speed at 30 mph.

Said a Farmington Hills police officer, "We're not sure about the lights.
We're still investigating the case."

Added another firefighter, "It'd be a case of the case."

As a precaution, lireflighters sprayed the wreckage with a chemical foam called Light Water, even though no leaking gasoline could be detected. "There's always a danger," said Hills Fire Chief Larry Karon at the scene. "That's why we sprayed it. The foam seals the vapors and keeps them from escaping."

"Any time you disengage them, you have that rubbing of metal parts and the danger of fire," Karon said.

Traffic on busy Grand River wasn't affected but police blocked the sur-rounding side streets.

### C'ville adopts new budget
