# Jazz stars highlight Montreux festival

Count Basie, Ella Fitzgerald, Oscar Peterson and Stan Getz top the star-studded lineup for the fourth Montreux Jazz Festival, which is to be held Aug. 31 through Sept. 5.

"A special tribute to Count Basie" with Clark Terry and Jay McShann typifies the caliber of artists performing nightly through the festival," said Robert E. McCabe, president of Detroit Renaissance, the organization producing the festival.

The festival has been expanded to include 11 concert sites. Baker's Keyboard Lounge, called the world's oldest jazz club, will be utilized by the festival to showcase former Detroit-area jazz great Elvin Jones on Friday-Sunday, Sept. 2-4.

Jones will remain in town to play Hart Plaza and Detroit Jams on Monday night, Sept. 5, at the Westin Hotel, Historic St. Andrew's Hall, a second new location, will feature two

evenings of jazz film clips compiled by David Cherok, followed by a New RAPA House Reunion Jam session.

LOCAL ARTISTS will headline free concerts. More than 70 concerts featuring Detroit's finest jazz ensembles and top-flight national college and Michigan high school bands will be presented admission-free at Hart Plaza and Grand Circus Park.

Symbolizing the Detroit and Montreux International Jazz Festival alliance, Detroit's Contemporary Jazz Quintet will appear at the Montreux, Switzerland, festival July 14 and then complete its international tour with performances at the Pori International Festival in Finland.

Jazz ensembles from the Swiss and Pori Festivals will be the featured international guests at the Detroit Festival.

"My Sister in This House" is directed by Yolanda Fleischer with David Fox as assistant.

Wendy Kesselman won the 1981 Susan Smith Blackburn Award for "My Sister in This House."

"My Sister in This House" is an intense story

of two sisters working as maids in a wealthy French household in the 1930s. Focusing on the relationship between the sisters and with their employer, the play is a study of power, its use and its impact.

Tickets for individual concerts go on sale June 16 at the box office, Hudson's, all CTC locations and any Auto Club location.

CONCERTS AT Meadow Brook start at 8 p.m. in the Howard C. Baldwin Pavilion on the OU campus near Rochester. Meadow Brook concerts begin June 23. The music festival continues through Sept. 4. Many different styles of musical entertainment are featured, including jazz/blg band, contemporary, classical, country and easy listening.

Stars such as Johnny Mathis, Tony Bennett, Harry Belafonte and Andy Williams will appear at Meadow Brook. Also in concert will be the Lettermen and Four Freshmen, Frankie Laine and Teresa Brewer, Fred Warling, Mitch Miller's sing-along and Richard Hayman's "Vive la France." Headliners of country music include Roy Clark, Glen Campbell and Tammy Wynette and B.J. Thomas. Jazz stylists include Chuck Mangione, Al Hirt and the Duke of Deltaland, Preservation Hall Jazz Band, and Clio Latine with the Detroit Symphony Pops.

The Detroit Symphony Orchestra's eight-week season of classical concerts will feature solo violinists, cellists and pianists. Conductors leading the symphony represent such ethnic backgrounds as Swedish, Russian, Korean, Japanese, Italian, English, Czech and American.

THE 11-WEEK music festival at Meadow Brook is rounded out with the contemporary sounds and comedy of stars like Kris Kristoferson, the (Irish) Rovers and Tom Paxton, Bill Cosby, Lou Rawls, Sammy Davis Jr., Victor Berge, "Hooked on Swing" with Larry Elgart's Orchestra, Meadow Brook Estate, Detroit Concert Band and Metropolitan Concert Band.

Festival entrances to lighted parking are off University Drive and off Adams Road. The pavilion, with its contoured lawn, seats more than 7,000 persons.

The grounds open two hours before concert time for picnics on the grounds and for waitered and cafeteria-style dining on Trumbull Terrace.

Meadow Brook Music Festival is a nonprofit cultural program of Oakland University.

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"WE ARE looking forward to presenting several concerts on the grounds of Cranbrook and will consider some off-campus performances also," he said.
