School chief is evaluated

After long debate, the Walled Lake Board of Education recently decided to have the superintendent's review compiled by a three-member committee.

Board President Robert Cooper appointed board members Betty Campion, Michael Reeds and Mario Tozzi to compile board members evaluation sheets.

Board members will complete evaluation sheets on the superintendent, but disagreement surfaced when some board members balked at signing their individual evaluation.

Some board members expressed concern about signing the forms. They said the board should evaluate the superintendent as a body. Another concern was liability over comments made by individual board members.

"The process (of compiling the evaluations) seemed acceptable to the majority of the board," said Superintendent Dr. Don Sheldon. "They seem to have discarded the idea of signing their evaluation sheets. I think this is a decent procedure and will accomplish what an evaluation process is supposed to do."

The evaluations should be compiled before tonight's regularly-scheduled board meeting.

Libraries offer cameras for loan with no charge

Beginning June 1, Polaroid instant cameras can be borrowed from both Farmington and Farmington Hills Community Libraries.

"They're part of our circulating collection," said the audio-visual chairwoman, Denise A. Albrecht. "Like our books, magazines and records, they are here for the public to use and enjoy."

The Farmington Community Library is participating in "Check This Out," a program providing free instant cameras to public libraries throughout the United States. The cameras, which are from the Sun series, feature built-in electronic flash and one-button operation. Sponsored by the Customer Service Division of Polaroid Corporation, the program is being offered in cooperation with the American Library Association (ALA).

According to program manager Victoria Carr, the idea of borrowing a camera from the library isn't as unusual as it may seem.

"Libraries offer a wide variety of services and materials to patrons," she said. "Instant cameras are a natural for an information-oriented facility such as the public library."

Peggy Barber, director of public information for the ALA, said, "This is the first time that a corporation has made a commitment on this scale to the nation's libraries. When times are tough and library budgets tight, we hope other companies will follow Polaroid's example."

Accreditation renewal received by seminary

St. John's Provincial Seminary in Plymouth has just received a 10-year renewal of accreditation by North Central Association and the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada, the Rev. Robert H. Byrne, president-rector, said. The seminary is the only accredited graduate theological in southeastern Michigan.

Byrne made the announcement after receiving the notification from the executive commission on institutions of high education of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

"St. John's faculty, students and staff can be very proud of this reaffirmation of the quality of our institution and its

programs," Byrne said. Other than the goals identified by St. John's in its self-study, no additional recommendations or directives were submitted by either accrediting agency.

The North Central Association accredits the ability of the institution to offer quality programs. Earlier this year the Association of Theological Schools in a similar action accredited the degree programs; master of divinity for a 10-year period; master of theological studies with preliminary approval until St. John's submits documentation this fall of its two-year experience in granting the degree.
