Contracts negotiated

Contract bargaining teams representing the Walled Lake Board of Education and Walled Lake union workers will have a busy summer — contracts are expiring with all 10 school-employee unions.

tracts are expiring with all 10 school-employee unions.

About 900 employees are represented by the 10 bargaining units, according to Superintendent Dr. Don Sheldon. The contracts have expiration dates at various times between June and August.

For the first time, school administration will not handle negotiations. Rills Thomas of the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB) will be responsible for bargaining.

"I can't really say why the board went in this direction, except that they believe this was the way to go," Sheldon said.

A negotiating session already took place with the largest employee group, the Walled Lake Education Association (WLEA), representing about 450 teachers.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION has established six major goals for negotiations. The top goal is to maintain the district's high standards of educational programming and equal opportunities for all students.

Other goals include controlling fringe benefit costs, providing a fair and equitable settlement within the financial resources of the district, and reaching a fair and reasonable agreement.
