Levin, Broomfield back EPA budget boost

EPA By a vote of 200 for and 167 gainst, the House raised the Environmental Protection Agency's fiscal 1984 udget by \$220 million over the recommendation of the Democratic-confered to ited House Appropriations Commit-

This raised 1984 EPA spending to 1,3 billion, which is \$350 million more han requested by President Reagan and equivalent to the pre-Reagan EPA udget of 1981. The vote occurred during debate on appropriations bill (IRR 3111) that alter was sent to the Senate. Supporter Timothy Wirth, D-Colo, omplained that for the past two years the House has acquiesced in massive, evere budget cuts at the EFA." Opponent Bill Frenzel, R-Minn, said ad management has been the EPA's borteoming and that "my constituents re tired of Congress tossing their mony at probelma..." Members voling yes wanted a 1984 FPA budget that is about 33 percent ligher than recommended by he Appropriations Committee. Voling yes: Dennis Hertel, D-Detroit, William Ford, D-Taylor, Sander Levin, D-Southfield and William Broomfield, Biltmingham. Carl Pursell did not vote.

CLEAN AIR: The House voted, 227 CLEAN AIR: The House voted, 227 or and 136 against, to prevent the EPA rom penalizing any of the 213 counties a 180 congressional districts that, due nainly to auto pollution, are violating he Clean Air Act.

Former EPA Administrator Anne

Burford had threatened sanctions such as cutting off highway grants, saying she was obligated to enforce the law as written by congress.

However, many lawmakers saw her threat as a velled attempt to pressure Congress to weaken the Clean Air Act.
The vote occurred as the House debated HR 3133 (see preceding vote). Supporter Henry Warman, D-Calli, said the House must block "the Administrations" elfort to push through as toothless Glean Air Act.
Opponent John Dingell, D-Mich., said "this vote is a vote on the environment. If you vote leyes you are voting for If you vote (yes) you are voting for

PRESIDENT: By a vote of 244 for and 169 against, the House adopted an amendment to cut about \$919,000 earmarked for ex-preseddents Carter, Ford and Nixon in Fiscal 1984.

The amendment keeps Secret Service protection and their annual Pension of 180,000 each. But it hans funding for staffs, office and scores of additional expenses taxpayers now pick up for their former presidents.

The cut was made in HR 3191, a spending bill later sent back to the House Appropriations Committee.

Sponsor Andrew Jacobs, D-Ind., said taxpayers should not pay "For offices and for staffs and for plant watering services and for staffs and for plant watering services and for the staffs and for plant watering services and for magazines and a whole cornucopia of freebles" that most other private citizens must buy on their own.

Opponent John Myers, R-Ind. said the favored creation of "a commission to make a study of this and find out what

Members voting yes wanted taxpayers to provide only Secret Service protection and pensions for ex-presidents.

ABORTION: By a vote of 226 for and 182 against, the Hosue adopted an

amendment prohibiting federal work-ers from using their government health insurance to-pay for abortions except when the mother's life is at stake. The language was attached to HR 3191 and caused the bill to be defeated and return to the Appropriations Com-mittee.

Members voting yes favored the anti-abortion language.

Supporter Mack Mattingly, R-Ga, said he "reluctantly" favored the bill "given the reliance of American economic growth on global economic recovery..."

Opponent Charles Grassley, R-lowa, said "the U.S. must not buckle under to the threats and idle claims form debiridden countries and the international banking community."

Senators voting yes supported the U.S. contribution to the IMF.
Carl Levin, D, and Donald Riegle, D, voted yes.

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
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
