### SENIOR WOMEN'S GOLF

A field of 144 women from all over the state were expected to compete in the 27th annual Michigan Senior Women's Golf Association (MSWGA) tournament yesterday at Farmington Hills Country Club.

Although the minimum age for eligibility in the MSWGA is 55 years, each tournament features many golfers age 70 and over. This year's roster of entrants include 23 women over 70 years of age — the oldest is Greta Burchfield of Plainfield, who is 82, and competes with a handicap of 31.

A total of 33 clubs are represented in this year's tourney. Of 45 registrants from Oakland County, 17 are from the Farmington-West Bloomfield area and 12 are from the Birmingham-Bloomfield area.

Mayor Hughes read proclamation declaring June 4, 1983 as "Life, Be in It" day and June 1 thru June 30, 1983 as "Life, Be in It" month, recognizing work of National Recreation Association.

Public Hearing was held on the proposed General Fund Budget total mills of 9.9930, including 1 mill for Capital Improvements and .4064 for Debt Levy. Council set date of June 6 for consideration of adoption of budget and tax levy determination for fiscal year beginning July 1, 1983.

Presentation of feasibility study relative to space needs of the Police Department was made by Carl Luckenbach/Robert L. Ziegelman, Inc. Council will meet with City Staff for review of the matter.

Mayor Hughes opened the regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills on June 13, 1983 at 7:30 P.M. Members present were: Burwell, Dolan, Hughes, Soronen and Williams. Absent: Lange and Wolf. Others present: City Manager Savage, Assistant City Manager Corick, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Bibeau.

Mayor Hughes declared June 14, 1983 National Flag Day and June 14 through July 4, 1983 as salute to honor America.

"Life Be in It" coloring contest sponsored by Parks and Recreation Department awarded prizes to Shannon Cairns, Scott Brod and Tracey Delaney. Minutes of May 17 and May 27 were approved as presented.

Project Plan for Economic Development Corporation, Altekay Company Project, was adjourned to June 27, 1983.

Rehearing of cost bearing for Greenacres paving SAD C-166 was set for June 27, 1983.

Rehearing of Richmond Hill water SAD C-168, determination and cost bearing set for June 27, 1983.

Council set Public Hearing date for tax abatement for Controlled Precision Machinery, Inc. for July 11, 1983.

Council accepted donation of 3.3 acres of land from Ronald and John Hanaway located at Drake and Freedom Roads.

Council approved option of 2.3 acres of land at Drake and Freedom Roads to Detroit Baptist Manor, subject to appropriate conveyance of the property to the City.

The request of liquor license for Blakeney's Ranch House, Inc. was adjourned to June 27, 1983.

Council approved parade permit for Farmington Founders Festival parade for July 30, 1983.

Amendment to Historic Districts and Commission, Ordinance C-9-83, was introduced to include Elmer Durham House, Stephen-Jennings House and Simmons-Hamill House.

Council decided that residents on Parker Street must re-submit petitions for paving.

Appointments to Farmington Area Arts Commission were confirmed by Council for Kathryn Briggs and Nancy Garvi. Council also approved appointments of Jean Fox and Catherine Egypt to the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Council adopted a resolution to pave Tuck, between 9 Mile and Grand River, using 1984 Community Development Block Grant funds.

Council recommended that staff and city attorney work in conjunction with attorney Ken Flaska to prepare a suitable ordinance and submit to the Planning Commission for their approval and recommendation.

Council adopted a resolution approving an additional two-year extension for final plan approval for Country Stream Subdivision.

Resolution was adopted authorizing City Manager to issue purchase order for procurement of annual supply of fertilizer for golf course.

William Tynjala College was granted one-year extension of Waiver on Sidewalk Installation with provision that sidewalk be constructed within two years.

Council approved hiring temporary employee in Parks and Recreation Department, Bruce McConnell, who is related to an appointee of Council.

Council approved cooperative purchasing program for fire equipment through Oakland County Fire Chiefs Association.

### CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mayor Bennett on June 6, 1983, in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

Present: Mayor Bennett, Councilmen Hartsock, Mitchell, Tupper, Yoder. City Officials Present: City Manager Deaton, Director Seibert, Attorney Kelly, City Clerk Imbey.

Minutes of previous meeting were approved.

Council held a Public Hearing to review the Special Assessment Roll for the Hillcrest Street Improvements, and adopted Resolution No. 5 of the Special Assessment procedure concerning the roll.

Minutes of other boards were reviewed and/or filed.

Council denied the request for sign variance for the Grand River/Hillcrest Plaza. Council instructed the City Manager to further review the Historical Commission's request for historic district designation on city maps and city extracurricular signs.

Council accepted with respect Dr. Joseph Gadow's termination of his service on the Farmington Area Commission on Aging.

Council considered a request from the Farmington Community Library to waive the library's Special Assessment for the Old Town Drain.

Council approved the request of Novi Ambulance, Inc. to administer blood pressure and EKG tests in the Downtown Center through June 11.

Council approved an outdoor Tent Sale for the Modern Men's Shop of Farmington during the week of June 10 through June 13, 1983.

Council adopted the Budget for the Fiscal Year 1983-84 and established the millage rate for the General Fund and Debt Service.

Council authorized the city's participation in the Michigan Municipal Risk Management Authority Stop-Loss Program.

Council adopted a resolution certifying Delinquent Special Assessments, Invoices and Water Bills.

Council received and filed the Department of Public Safety Quarterly Report for January thru March, 1983.

The following ordinance was adopted:

**ORDINANCE NO. C-97-83**  
**THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS**  
That the Traffic Control Order issued by the Chief of Police of the City of Farmington, dated February 6, 1978, is hereby amended as follows:  
Chapter 2, Section 2.8 as provided for in Section 2.8.3 of the Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships and Villages.

**CHAPTER 2 "YIELD RIGHT OF WAY STREETS" — Add the following:**  
Section 2.8 ADAMS STREET AT GRACE  
ADAMS STREET (WESTBOUND) AT CAIS

This ordinance is declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety.

This ordinance was introduced, adopted and enacted at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on June 6, 1983, and will become effective immediately.
