University shorted on state funds

Oakland University should be ex-pecting an enrollment growth, not a de-cline, OU president Joseph E. Cham-pagne said.

And he told a legislative committee that the regional university has been under-funded by the state compared to the other 12 comparable, four-year col-leges.

Law school honors judge

Prior to becoming a judge, Andrews was city attorney for Clawson, president of the Oakland County Bar Association, and union attorney for the Troy Police Officers Association, the Troy Command Officers Association and the Clawson POA.

"We do not have a complete response to the growing dilemma of tuition in-creases." Champagne said in lengthy testimony recently to the House Sub-committee on Higher Education Appro-priations. OU recently raised its tul-tions 10-15 percent of the coming school year.

CHAMPAGNE said that while en-rollments statewide may fall in the years ahead, "southeastern Michigan presents a unique set of circumstances which could cause enrollment stabliza-

OU HAS been treated less well than other colleges among the 12 regional schools, Champagne complained.
Its enrollment has grown 12 percent since 1977, while others have declined, but its share of state funding has remained stated be, resulting in "an enormous crossion in the amount of revenue available per student."
Champagne made these comparisons:

In 1977 OU received \$1,625 in state funds per full-time equivalent student while the state average for comparable schools was \$1,637, a dif-ference of barely \$12.

But currently OU's state appropriation is \$2,144 compared to \$2,396 for the others, a difference of \$250. (His comparison excluded the so-called Big Three: University of Michigan, Michigan State Univesity and Wayne State University.)

University.)

HE CALLED on the legislature to increase funding to colleges so that the level of tuition could be 25 percent of total revenues and state aid raised to 75 percent.

Currently, OU has a \$35 million budget with about nearly \$20 million, a little more than half, coming from the legislature.

"In Michigan," said Champagne, "we are at the 40-60 ratio and should strive through adequate state funding to return to the 25-75 ratio model that existed here not too long ago."



cy of funding, we have had to curtall caroliment in our highest growth areas, such as engineering, computer science and business administration," Cham-pagne said, predicting a slight overall decline in enrollment.

The OU president pointed to a paradox. "On the one hand, we are preaching that increased education and training will be necessary in our emerging high technology society. On the other hand, we are closing the doors to students in high-demand areas."
