Police suspect drug sales in 2 West Bloomfield homes

Investigations into an alleged burglary and a threatened suicide prompted West Bloomfield Police to raid two township homes last week for suspected drugs.

A Farmington Hills man, charged with breaking and entering, alerted West Bloomfield Police to possible drug trafficking at the house he is accused of burglarizing, police said. And police intervention in a reported drug overdose exposed an apparent drug den and possible stolen car operation.

Robert Alan Cischke, 35, was bound over to Oakland County Circuit Court Friday for the theft of a \$400 tool box and tools from a house on Drake be-

tween 14 Mile and Maple June 13. He was released on personal bond of \$5,000, according to a 48th District Court spokesman.

Circuit court arraignment is Tuesday, July 5, before Judge Richard Kohn.

HOME OWNERS, who left the house about 9 p.m. for an hour, returned home to find Cischke, an acquaintance, there. The couple discovered their breezeway was broken into and a tool box and tools were missing. They accused Cischke of the burglary, but he initially denied it, according to police Sgt. Mike Madigan. Cischke even

helped them to look for it, police said. Later, police recovered the items in tall weeds behind a shed about 75 feet from the house and sought out Cischke, police said.

As a result of Cischke's statements, police obtained a search warrant from the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office, raiding the house at 7:16 a.m. Tuesday, said Madigan.

Suspected drugs, drug paraphernalia and allegedly unregistered guns were confiscated, Madigan said. Charges against the residents are pending, awaiting analysis of the suspected drugs by the state crime lab, he said.

IN A SECOND incident, an ex-wife alerted police that her 37-year-old former husband was threatening suicide at his Portpool address Thursday, Madigan said.

Responding Patrolman Chris Page approached the house about 6:48 p.m. to find the victim walking unsteadily and with slurred speech — but no signs that he had been drinking.

When he entered the house, Page saw evidence of narcotics use and possible drug trafficking, including bills of large denomination, rolling papers and baggies filled with suspected marijuana, Madigan said.

As the man's condition appeared to deteriorate, Page called for Emergency Medical Service and urged him to show him what drugs he had taken — to aid paramedics.

The man allegedly told Page he had taken Valium, a tranquilizer.

ACCOMPANYING THE man to a bedroom, Page saw a plastic baggie filled with a substance which appeared to be cocaine, Madigan said. In the bathroom, Page saw a hypodermic syringe ready for use and a burnt spoon, police said.

Township paramedics treated the

man at the scene. He was transported to Pontiac General Hospital, where he was hospitalized for a drug overdose, according to the EMS report.

Police obtained a search warrant from the prosecutor's office under which they returned to the house and discovered two allegedly stolen vehicles in the garage, more than \$10,000 cash in the house, additional narcotics and guns.

Last week, police were awaiting the suspect's hospital release before filing charges and identifying him. Police also are considering charges against a live-in companion, Madigan said.

Introduction of Zoning Map Amendment C62-299 (ZT 7-5-83) was approved to rezone 3.63 acres of land located 782 feet north of Howard Road and 1240 feet east of Hagerty from RA-1 to LB-10.

Zoning Map Amendment C61-300 (ZT 8-3-83) was introduced to rezone property at 21427 Tulane from P-1 to B-3.

Resolutions 3 and 4 were approved for road improvement in Quaker Valley, Quaker Valley Farms and Quaker Valley Farms Addition Subdivisions. SADC C-177.

Council approved Resolution 5 on cost for road improvement in Quaker Valley, Quaker Valley Farms and Quaker Valley Farms Addition Subdivisions. SADC C-177.

Resolution 5 was approved for cost for sewer for Parker Street, SADC C-178.

Council approved Resolution 5 for cost for road improvement for Medbury, SADC C-175.

Council approved Resolution 5 for cost for road improvement for Colfax, SADC C-174.

Council approved the use of Community Development Block Grant Program/Job Bill Funds.

Council decided to consider further options for the Police Facility.

Appointments by the Mayor were confirmed by Council for Margaret Downs and Susan Remmel to the Board of Canvassers.

Council approved hiring an employee in Parks and Recreation Department who is related to an appointee of Council.

Council authorized City Manager to execute an easement for routing cables on existing poles at Fourteen Mile and Inkster Roads for Booth Cable Company, contingent upon review by City Attorney and MetroVidcom Company.

Following the Public Hearing meeting, Council convened for Executive Session to discuss pending litigation.

Meeting adjourned at 11:45 p.m.
