Programs reduced in Hill's job bill

The cost of drainage improvements in the Richland Gardens area has forced Farmington Hills officials to revise their list of needed improve-

ments that would have been paid for with the city's \$173,000 from the Federal Emergency Jobs Bill.

Last week, City Council members agreed to apply to the Department of Housing and Urban Development for the money to pay for seven drainage and sidewalk improvements.

Council members in a 5-1 vote on Monday revised that plan choosing instead to use all the anticipated federal money to pay for repairing and replacing a 50-y ar-old storm drain system on Collingham and Oxford between Grand River and Shilohwasee roads.

Councilman Charles Williams opposed revising the city's application. He said the city should stick to what it had originally proposed. Councilman William Lange was absent.

WHEN ORIGINALLY listed as the top priority out of seven listed projects, the Oxford-Independence drainage system, which when improved would tie into the Richland Gardens drain system, was supposed to cost an estimated \$125,000.

But after city officials received construction bids for the entire Richland Gardens storm drain area, including improvements for Oxford-Independence, they realized \$125,000 would not cover the project's cost.

The construction bids, however, included approximately 3,500 feet of lateral pipe (which tie houses to the drain system) needed for the Richland Gardens project that was not anticipated in the Oxford-Independence drain project, said Thomas Blasell, director of public services, in a report to council members.

Money will be taken from the city's local road drainage accounts, available because of low bids received last year, to pay for the other projects that were to be funded with the jobs bill money.

"We had some projects in mind for that money (local road funds)," said City Manager Lawrence Savage.

But city officials will reorder the priorities of needed improvements and determine which projects will be scheduled, Savage said.

Other projects that were expected to be funded with jobs bill money include completion of a 1,555-foot sidewalk on the north side of Shilohwasee; replacing culverts, and ditching and drainage improvements; and cleaning ditches and removing debris.

Even though the projects totaled \$214,000, officials had hoped to get lower than usual bids so expenses would not overly exceed the federal money.

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
