Rice gears to kick off season at Silverdome

It's not too early to think prep foot-ball — especially for Catholic League foes Birmingham Brother Rice and De-troit Catholic Central.

The Warriors and Shamrocks open their 1984 schedules Saturday, Sept. 10, at the Pontiac Silverdome for the third consecutive year as participants in the Prep Rick-Off Classic. The football double-beader featuring the two popu-lar Detroit-area schools has attracted a combined total of 27,000 the past two seasons.

This year's slate opens with Brother Rice against the Chicago city champions — Mt. Carmel High School — at 5:30 pm. In the nightens, Catholic Central, defending champions of the Detroit Catholic League, plays Traverse City.

According to Rice coach Al Fracassa, Mt. Carmel has lost only two games the past three seasons. The school from the city's south side won the state champlomahip in 1980.

"THEY'RE A cound Catholic school with a good tradition," said Fracassa, Rice's wetern couch who has twice rejected offers from Michigan State University to become an assistant coach. "They'll be bringing forms a few thousand people who'll get a chance to see the Silverwictors for the first time. It will be a very competitive game and the kids are looking forward to playing

them. It should be very exciting.

"Twe been watching some of their films from last year and that's all I really know about them," he said. "Twe invited them to attend one of our serimmages and I'm going to see one of theirs."

Catholic Central is undefeated in the Prep Rick-Off Classic while Rice split its games.

The Shamrocks defeated Eaton Ra-pids in 1981, 27-0, then came back for a fairly easy 34-16 victory last season over Traverse City.

Rice lost to Youngstown Cardinal Mooney in overtime in its first game, 16-13. The Warriors then needed overtime to get past Dearborn last fall, 17-14.

BROTHER RICE logged an overall 5-4 record last year. This year's squad was burt by graduation, but there will be 22 returning players.

Meanwhile, Catholic Central mutered a 7-4 overall record last fail. The Shamrocks, who lost powerful running back Jeff Gatt, that tot Rice two times last year (in the boys' bowl, 7-0, and the Catholic League finals, 10-0).

The Prep Rick-Off Classic drew 12,000 people in 1981 and some 15,000 people last season. Officials from both CC and Rice, which co-sponent the event, are pushing for a crowd of at least 10,000 this year.

Tickets, priced at \$5, are now on sale at all of the participating schools.
