How a new proposed police building would be paid for remains unanswered, but Farmington Hills officials will meet with architects, police and other-city staff to discuss what type of building is needed to alleviate the current as the proposed in the proposed building is needed to alleviate the current as the proposed building is scheduled for 7:30 pm. Among the issues that will be discussed at the meeting are the building's size, costs and design and the use of the existing police department building once a new one is built. Council members have been discussing moving some administrative offices into the existing building once the department moves to a new facility. But in late June, council members voted 6-1 to forgo buying the empty school on Middlebelt north of 10 Mile.
Even though the school has not yet been sold, city officials are moving shead with preliminary plans for puting up a new department.
Council members, however, had expressed concern ever the architectioning at \$2,55,815 estimate for a new building, including the purchase of at least two parcels near city hall. Officials apparently had expected a new facility to cost about \$3.5 million at the most.

But even renovating the empty, 41,000-square-foot school, architects estimated, would cost the city about \$3,010,833. Even though renovating the school is cheaper, location and energy savings appeared to point council members in the direction of a new facility near city hall.

The recently adopted 1983-84 budget does not provide any "new money" for a police building. But after dipping into reserves to balance the budget, the city still will have about \$1.3 million in surplus money that could be used in part to begin paying for a station, Costick said.

Science gets new advisor

If you're an elementary-school teacher with a strong science back-ground, then you may be interested in a recent decision by the Farmington Board of Education.

Siting in regular session last Monday evening, the board voted unanimously to establish the position of "elementary science consultant" in an attempt to improve its presentation of the subject next term.

The new consultant will work with teachers of students in grades three through five in four Farmington elementary schools.

"Nationally, the teaching of science isn't what it ought to be," said Farmington Superintendent Lew Schulman after the meeting, "Generally speaking, elementary teachers have a general background. Some of them don't know much science.

"Again, speaking very generally, seidence ducation isn't what we'd like it toy be. We'd like to strengthen and improve it."

The consultant, who will fill a union position, will develop science lesson plans and work with teachers in the classrooms, according to Schulman.

"It's not an administrative position at all," he said, "and maybe we shouldn't have used the word consultant. This person's sole job will be to teach kids."

One board member who agreed wholeheartedly with the decision was Trustee Janice Roliek, a former elementary-school science teacher.

"We found it (teaching elementary
