

U-M Students Join Welfare Mothers in County Protests

ANN ARBOR — University students joining mothers on welfare in a sit-in demonstration were arrested at the Washtenaw County Building and charged with trespassing.

Fifty-two U-M students and women were seized on a second floor corridor by sheriff's deputies and taken to jail. Thursday's demonstration followed the arrest, the previous day, of the managing editor of the student newspaper, the Michigan Daily, Steve Willstrom, 21, of Oak Park, who was arrested and charged with assaulting a deputy when he appeared at the County Building to cover a meeting between welfare mothers and county officials.

The mothers had been demonstrating for several days for more money to buy winter clothes for their children.

Of the 52 arrested, 15 were welfare mothers, eight were coeds or women supporting the ADC mothers, and the rest were men, mostly U-M students.

DETROIT — Attorneys for Riverview School District have filed suit in Wayne County Circuit Court asking a temporary injunction to force its 167 teachers to work.

Judge Benjamin D. Burdick ordered a hearing for Monday for the teachers to show cause why the injunction should not be issued. Meanwhile, the district threatens to dismiss the 39 non-tenure teachers who are also on strike.

WASHINGTON — Patrick Cardinal O'Boyle has given disident Washington-area priests until Sept. 14 to recant their views on birth control or face church penalties.

Fifty-two of the area's 385 Roman Catholic priests had signed a statement disavowing from Pope Paul's recent encyclical reaffirming the church's ban on artificial methods of birth control. The priests contended that married couples may use artificial contraception "according to their con-

science" in some circumstances.

Lagos, Nigeria — Nigeria has consented to let Red Cross planes fly a daylight relief airlift to an airstrip in secessionist Biafra until Sept. 12.

The settlement narrowly averted a possible head-on collision between Nigeria and the Red Cross, which has been trying to get emergency food and medical supplies to starving victims of the 14-month civil war.

NEW YORK — Three bank robbers used a speedboat named "Chester" for their getaway after holding up a City Island bank and sailing off with between \$40,000 and \$75,000. A small armada of police and Coast Guard craft searched the Long Island Sound but no trace was found of the 16-foot "Chester."

BONN — The Soviet Union has accused West Germany of ending its "hostile attitude" towards Russia and gave up its attempts to exert influence in

Eastern Europe or face the consequences.

Bonn believes the Soviets are trying to divert attention from itself by blaming West Germany for all the ills of Europe. Meanwhile, the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia reports occupation troops in Czechoslovakia have been ordered into cities bordering West Germany because of disorders there.

BATON ROUGE, La. — Governor John J. McKeithen, who backed the presidential nomination of Hubert Humphrey, says he cannot in good conscience offer further support to the vice-president.

McKeithen's action appeared almost certain to throw Louisiana's 10 electoral votes to George Wallace. McKeithen said his main objection to Humphrey was the vice-president's statement that "President Eisenhower's greatest contribution to this nation was naming Earl Warren chief justice of the United States Supreme Court."
