

Murphy returns Youth Corps grant

Oakland County is returning \$13,000 in Michigan Youth Corps money because it can't find enough jobs to spend it on.

But the money is likely to come back from Lansing via the Oakland Intermediate School District, and local governments may contact the school office with requests.

"We have already received over \$1 million and have employed more than 1,000 youths," said County Executive Daniel T. Murphy. "However, we cannot expect people in the county to create jobs just to spend the money. We had no choice except to return the money."

MURPHY SAID the state agency, headed by former state Sen. Doug Ross of Southfield, gave both the county general government and the intermediate school district the same list of agencies which needed summer youth employment.

"When we checked with Oakland Schools," said Murphy, "we found they had already disbursed those funds to meet all the needs the state identified, except those in the city of Pontiac."

"So we worked out an agreement with Oakland Schools, and they will administer the program. But my staff will be ready to assist local units of government requesting additional job placements."

DOUG JOHNSON, a spokesman in Ross' office, said the agency which usually administers federal CETA funds was selected to receive state Youth Corps funds.

He indicated the state would have no objection if local officials decided among themselves that one agency is better equipped to run the program.

Johnson said funds were allocated on the basis of unemployment rates in each locality.

County funds denied

Oakland backs off Clinton project

In a surprise move, Oakland County commissioners Thursday rejected a \$20,000 appropriation for the Clinton River Watershed Council's stormwater management project.

Earlier, the plan had slipped through the board's planning and building committee without opposition and won 7-3 approval in the finance committee.

"We've never funded this type of project before," said Commissioner Larry Pernick, D-Southfield, voicing his objection to the full board. "It is usually done by the communities."

And the full board voted 13-12 in favor of the plan, one shy of the 14 needed for passage.

It was the only defeat for any major proposal on a day when nearly every other spending item got at least 20 votes.

THE PLANNING and building committee had favored the project as a means of encouraging and aiding communities to control water runoff from development.

The watershed council proposed a Stormwater Management Workshop and Process Manual, with contributions totaling nearly \$240,000.

These included nearly \$30,000 from

several communities, \$52,816 from the Joyce Foundation, \$137,500 from the federal government and — it had hoped — \$20,000 from the county. The county's rejection leaves the watershed council with \$240,000 in actual or promised cash to proceed.

Other than Pernick's remark, the county money was voted down practically without discussion.

Area commissioners favoring it were James Doyon, D-Madison Heights, Marilyn Gosling, R-Bloomfield Hills, Thomas A. Lay, R-West Bloomfield, John McDonald, R-Farmington, Ralph Nelson, R-Rochester, Robert Page, R-Birmingham, Alex Perinoff, D-Southfield, and Roy Rewold, R-Rochester.

Opposed were G. William Cadell, R-Walled Lake, John Calandaro, R-Novi, George B. Jackson, R-Birmingham, Susan Kuhn, R-Clawson, Nancy McConnell, R-Bloomfield Hills, John Olsen, R-Huntington Woods, and Pernick.

IN OTHER money matters, the Board of Commissioners approved:

• \$250,000 as the county share of \$818,000 in improvements to the Oakland/Pontiac and Oakland/Troy airports. State and federal funds will make up the difference. The vote was 23-2 with Commissioners Pernick of

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Southfield and Donald Geary, D-Ferndale, dissenting.

Oakland/Pontiac will get an addition to the crash-fire-rescue maintenance building, restaurant and restroom renovations in the terminal, maintenance equipment and completion of an entrance road.

Oakland/Troy will get replacement of its lighting system, a \$150,000 terminal building complex, construction of 18 T-hanger units for \$245,000 and \$125,000 in other T-hanger work.

• Acceptance of a \$62,508 grant from the Michigan Aeronautics Commission for widening and lighting runway 4/22 at Oakland/Pontiac airport. The county's matching funds had been

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approved in the earlier resolution. • Taking of bids for 95 tornado warning devices for county departments. The vote was 22-4 on the estimated \$23,750 expenditure.

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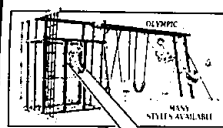
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
