comed at dozens of homes along the route and are corresponding with about 200 families. They've spent 40 percent of their trip with people met on the road, with the remaining 60 percent spent camping. In the 10½ months they've been gone, they've stopped at a motel just three times. Thus far, the Millards have traveled down the California coast and across Arizona, New Mexico and Texas into the Deep South. They remember the ride along the Rio Grande as the mest grieling stretch of the trip because of the 70 miles or so of steep hills along the route. They spent three or four months of the winter exploring the south, including a trip down the Florida peninsula to Key West.

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WITH SPRING in the air, the Millards began peddiling up the Atlantic
coastiline and then through the Appalachain mountains towards New England. Greg said that his flavorite sections of the trip were spent along the
Blive Ridge Parkway in North Carolina.

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The couple intends to ride through
the upper peninsula, Wisconsin and
Minnesota before dippling down Into
South Dakota for a stretch into Wyoming. Upon reaching the Rocky Mountains, they plan to ride north along the
Continental Divide before proceeding
across Montana towards Seattle, Oregon, and the trip back down the west
coast.

The only thing we're concerned

about is making the Rockies by Sep-tember," Greg said. He noted that if winter blocks their path, the couple will swing south along the Mississippi, back through the Deep South, New England and the midwest for a try at the mountain sgain next year. "We love this trip, really," Anne said.

THE MILLARDS had been married just five months when they set out on their cross-country tour. While in the service, Greg had met Anne in her native Zurich, Switzerland and brought her to California. He was employed as an accountant, while she was a secretary.

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Although they'd never done much biking or camping, the Millards decided that the trip would be a good way to introduce Anne to America. In the 14 months that she's lived in the U.S., Anne has learned to speak fluent English.

Once they return, they plan to write a book about their experiences. They've received plenty of advance publicity so far and have been interviewed by 45 newspapers at stops along the route. "It's been great," Greg said. "That's one thing that people can't believe: We've never had a bad experience on this trip."

He said that the biggest setback they He said that the biggest setback they encountered was the time he broke an axle in Texas and had to walk 12 miles for a new one. He's also changed 36 spare tires along the way, carrying extra inner tubes and tires for the inevitable flat.

AS MIGHT BE EXPECTED, the Millards are well-tanned and in enviable physical condition from their trek.

They average 70-80 miles per day, with Greg carrying 115 pounds total on his Schwinn Varsity and Anne carrying 100 pounds on her Schwinn Tarveler.

They carry up to 15 pounds of canned food, fruit and peanut butter in amounts which can last them three to five days on the road, Greg concedes that their bikes and some of the camping equipment they carry might be deemed inappropriate by other cross-country cyclists, but so far, they have no complaints.

Greg estimated that the couple has spent approximately \$4,500 during the course of their trip, which has included stops at attractions such as Disneyworld, EPCOT and the space center.
