

# Express blank Wolves in soccer exhibition

The Livonia Wolves, newly crowned Great Lakes soccer champs, got a taste of the big leagues Monday night as the Detroit Express visited Bentley High School for an exhibition match.

The crowd, estimated at 1,200, enjoyed the fast-paced action as the Express came away with a 5-0 victory.

"We looked good for about 30 minutes," said Wolves coach Joe Mancini. "I didn't think it was that bad (the score), but we're not pros."

"There was some good talent and skill displayed out there."

Thanks to the solid defense of the

Young brothers, Bill and Rick, the Wolves stayed close during the first half of play against the defending American Soccer League (ASL) champs.

"They're both good players," said Mancini. "They kept us in the game awhile."

But at the 20-minute mark, Jim Cabarra, on a pass from Andy Chapman, scored the first of his two goals to make it 1-0.

Twelve minutes later, Cabarra scored again to lift the Express a two-goal cushion.

AND JUST before the half, Paul Millette kicked in a rebound shot past

Wolves goalie Brian Eby to give the Express a three-goal cushion.

Millette, visiting player-coach Brian Timmer, was added to the Express roster because of injuries to starters Keith Murphy and Billy Boljevic. Millette, who will be a senior this fall, is a high school All-American from Pascagoula, Miss.

The Wolves may have been a little tired after clinching the Great Lakes crown on Sunday, a 2-1 double overtime victory against Dearborn Unlimited.

The win pushed the team's unbeaten mark for the spring season to 11-0-1.

Forward Pete Camilleri was the hero. He scored both goals, including the game-winner at 1:07 of the second

overtime.

"Tonight we were thinking slow and playing slow," admitted Mancini. "It's second nature for them (the Express). They practice every day."

The Wolves stepped up their pressure in the second half, but came up empty-handed despite a pair of golden scoring opportunities (both shots hit the crossbar).

THE EXPRESS, meanwhile, added two more goals in the second half. Chapman, last year's ASL scoring champ, notched the fourth (from Cabarra) and Steve Mihalovich (from Chapman) added the final goal.

"We started all of our regulars who could play," said Express defender

Scott Westbrook. "We substituted as the game went along. We were playing back-to-back games and that's tough. But I didn't play Sunday because I sat out (for three yellow cards)."

"I thought they (the Wolves) were a good team. They worked the ball well and had two good chances to score."

Young then appraised the other side.

"They have the aggressiveness, quickness and experience," said the Livonia native, who plays for Alma College. "They did a lot of switching up front. It's something we weren't used to. It's a different system that works well."

YOUNG was still savoring Sunday's triumph.

"This game (with the Express) was meaningful because it probably won't happen again," he said. "Yesterday's game (on Sunday) was more intense. It was more fun because it was close. Tonight it was hard to get into the proper frame of mind."

Mancini was impressed with Express defender Trevor Franklin and midfielder Mike Powers.

"They're good physically and are both gentlemen," said the Wolves coach. "They really set up the plays and use the entire field."

Many of the Express players compete in the Major Indoor Soccer League and use the ASL season to keep in shape.

### Regional title next goal for Kiwanis club

Birmingham Kiwanis, a baseball team comprised of players from Birmingham and Troy under 12, open the Pee Wee Reese Midwest Regional tournament 2 p.m. today in Sterling Heights, with hopes of advancing to the national championship in Georgia.

Kiwanis, winners of the Little Caesar's Amateur Federation with a 13-3 record, won the district championship Sunday in a 10-4 victory over Sterling Heights Team Five.

Today's game is against a Detroit team sponsored by the Kronk Recreation Center. The game is at Baumgardner Park, located at 15 Mile and Schoenerr.

The eight-team double-elimination tournament will have its championship game 2 p.m. Sunday. The national tournament runs Aug. 4-7 in Forest Park, Ga.

Kiwanis defeated Team Five, 10-4, with an explosion of runs in the seventh inning Sunday. Peter Frend and Ricky Terecattelli combined to drive in three runs in the seventh. Terecattelli drove home two in the sixth.

Chris Favaro, who was picked up from Redford for the tournament, was the winning pitcher as he allowed four hits and fanned 11. He also drove in what proved to be the winning run.

Kiwanis has been led by pitchers Frend, Paul Mancini, Frank Falkowski and John Rose. The hitting leader in 5-foot-11, 155-pound catcher Mike Maddie, who has clubbed 12 of the team's 25 home runs.

#### TOP TANKER

Oakland University, already a powerhouse in NCAA Division II swimming, greatly improved its chances for a national championship with the signing of Matt Croghan, an All-American last season with Pomona Junior College in Fremont, Calif.

Pete Hovland, the Pioneers' coach, landed Croghan and four other swimmers whose lifetime bests are already near or over the NCAA qualifying standards, bolstering a squad that was second in the nation last season.

Croghan could be the key to the school's second national crown. His best in the 1,650-meter freestyle (18:06.8) would have ranked in the top three in the NCAA's last season behind a pair of Oakland swimmers, and his best in the 100 freestyle (4:39.9) would have ranked in the top six.

Hovland used to swim at California-Chico, is a native of San Jose and has excellent West Coast connections. Among those connections is the swimming coach at Hayward State, who just happens to be Matt's brother, Mark.

"His brother was looking for a Division II school last spring with strong academics and Mark recommended our program to him," said Hovland. "Mark and Matt were impressed and excited about our prospects of competing for a national championship."

#### GO-CART RACES

A benefit for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital will take place Saturday at the Iceberg Golf Center in Mt. Clemens, where three divisions of go-cart races will be held, along with a raffle drawing for a Shelby Charger.

During the month of July, qualifying races took place with the top 10 challengers earning a spot in the championship heat, which gets under way 8 p.m. Saturday. Divisions are in the 12-18 age group, men over 18 and women over 18. Each divisional winner will receive a 1983 go-cart.

Chip Iceberg, owner of the golf center and a trick shot artist on the links, was a participant in the St. Jude Celebrity Golf Classic which took place last month at the Great Oaks Country Club in Rochester.

#### DIVERS ADVANCE

Three area divers have advanced to the finals of the U.S. Diving age-group championships with outstanding performances in zone qualifying in Pennsylvania.

Caroline Kennedy, who as a sophomore last season at Birmingham Groves became the youngest diver ever to win the state high school title, qualified on the one-meter springboard and just missed qualifying on the three-meter. Matt Clark, 17, of Troy Athens High School, qualified on the three-meter board, and Tim Carlson, who will be a senior at Clawson, qualified on both.

All three are members of the Great Lakes Academy Diving team. They compete in the age-group championships in Austin, Texas, this weekend, which are limited to divers 17 and under.

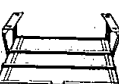

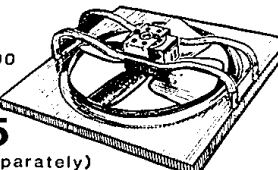
