# **EDC** board named

The first task of Farmington's new Economic Development Corp (EDC) will be to design an application so area commercial and industrial businesses may request tax-exempt bonding to de-crease costs of development.

crease costs of development. Designed under state law to stimu-late seconomic growth, Farmingtons EDC may itsue bonds to finance or re-finance the cost of commercial or in-dustrial projects.

dustrial projects. Two weeks after forming the financ-ing authority, Farmingtion City Council Monday appointed the ENCs first beard of directors. Their task is to re-view developer's projosais for financ-ing. If the city planning commissioners approve proposed projects, the de-veloper can then find a purchaser, for the EDC board of directors includes Farmington residents John Cotton, John Gilin and Härry Lapham Jr. --the three who originally petitioned the city council to form the authority. Nursing homes are the last taste of life that many of us will experience, yet a listing of state violations demon-strates that necessities are sometimes neglected when it comes to senior citi-

strates that necessities are sometimes neglected when it comes to senior citi-zen care. But Citizens for Better Care, which works as an office in Farmington Hills, works as an advocate for the aged who need help in resolving a grievance against living conditions in nursing bornes or homes for the aged. They also act as a watchdog over the Department of Public Health. "A lot of what we try to do is get the CBC Project Director Cells Savonen. "We don't have any regulatory authori-ty, but the health department does and the state. Last year they studied the state state year they studied the the state. The facilities that were classified Band I had the smallest number of identified problems. The homes listed in Band III had the largest number of clatations. There are 60 homes listed in Band III and 80 homes in Band I. The majority of the homes in the state are in the "average" — Band II. None of the Band III homes are in Farmington or Farmington Hills.

THE LIST hasn't been updated and some homes may have fallen into the Band HII rank or improved their condi-tions and were taken out of the catego-ry, according to Michigan Department of Health Facility Licenses and Certifi-cation Chief Dr. Richard Yerian. The health department makes an an-hual check of each home, which is sup-posed to be a "surprise visit." Howev-er, each home is visited three months before the home's license expires, which allows the manager of the home to put on a clean face and prepare for the state's check, Savonen said. Mott Hand I facilities receive a "modified" survey, Band II homes receive a "fouline" survey and Band III homes receive a "fail" survey. The state sends the home a lice violations and the nursing home is to return a no-
