Life's downers are necessary for growth

In a Peanuts cartoon, Charlie Brown and Lucy are sitting on a step talking and Lucy says, "Sometimes I get discouraged." Charlie answers, "Well, Lucy, life does have its ups and downs, you know."

Lucy responds, "But why, why should it? Why can't life be all ups? Why can't I go from an up to an upper up? I don't want any downs, just ups, ups and more ups."

This is our natural desire to have life present us with only ups and more ups. There is a paradox in the view that God blesses faithful people with good things, and the view expressed in the Book of Job that "God delivers the afflicted by their affliction, and opens their ear by adversity."

Over and over again Scripture presents a message that pain, frustration and affliction are means through which we learn about life. It is still a surprise to visit someone who is very ill and find that they experience good things in the midst of their trouble. It is not unusual to go away from such a visit feeling more strength and hope than before one made the visit.

THE CHARACTERISTIC that life is born at the same time it is being destroyed is seen in the life of Jeremiah, who lived around 600 B.C. He believed that he was called to warn his people about the impending doom which he saw for his nation. His nation did not wish to see the truth. They did not wish to grapple with the injustice toward slaves, their wealth in the midst of poverty, their immortality, and their abandonment of God.

Jeremiah was arrested, beaten and imprisoned again and again for his stand. Attempts were made to kill him. Tradition is that he was forcibly taken to Egypt as his people fled from invading armies and that there he was killed by his own people.

When our religion tells us that adversity and judgment bring us back to health, we react like Lucy. "No, all I want is ups and more ups." It is very difficult for people to hear anything but success and progress. We would like to move along in the jetstream of life, without storms and reverses. It is a paradox that such a person as Jeremiah is a source of strength and hope even today.

OUR TIME PARALLELS Jeremiah's time. Deep insecurities abound in our personal and in the national and international realms. A national spokesperson for the peace movement tells us that many of the experts in nuclear arms expect a war in the next 10 years, and that 170 million will die in the first boom of such a war.

Many are insecure and frightened about the future. Yet the prophet will say we must let go of our frantic search for security and fun to struggle with adversity.

Out of his experience, the author of Peanuts, Charles Schulz says, "Adversity is what makes you mature. The growing soul is watered best by tears of sadness."

There is a place for positive thinking and building of self-esteem in religious teaching. There is also a place for the value of adversity, for bumping up against the wall and facing life as it really is.

Raising healthy children requires both dimensions. The paradox still remains, adversity builds character and depth of spirit. Those who have passed through the darkest valleys have become sources of our greatest hope and inspiration. We need such persons in our time.

What causes an asthma attack? The American Lung Association of Southeastern Michigan (ALASEM) family asthma program will explore the variety of causes for asthma episodes at 7 p.m. Aug. 18 in doctors' dining rooms C and D of Oakland Boulevard, Dearborn.

HEALTHY INDIVIDUALS who require specific surgical procedures that can be performed in one day on an outpatient basis can now take advantage of Harper Hospital's new — new cost for patients — Ambulatory Surgery Center (ASC). The \$2-million facility opened July 28.

One-day surgery has several advantages for the patient in addition to cost savings. The patient can return home within hours of surgery, minimizing any interruption in their daily lives.

The separation of inpatient hospital care and outpatient elective surgery also gives family members an opportunity to be closer to the patient during the time of the operation.

The new ASC is located on the third floor of the Harper-Grace Hospital's Professional Building at 4160 John R. at Willis. Patients coming into the center can park in the surface lot just north of the building. All necessary blood tests, lab work and surgery preparations are performed in the center.

Some of the one-day-only procedures done in the new center include plastic and reconstructive surgery, urologic, otolaryngologic, oral, otolaryngologic (ear, nose and throat), ophthalmologic (eye), and cosmetic surgeries and biopsies.
