EFORE WE GET into the meat of this one, I want to make it clear that the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association abouid be commended for the work it has put into its annual all-star football gram.

work it has put into its annual all-star football game.
Those who questioned whether or not the game would fly seem convinced now that it can — evidenced by the extiting 24-10 East victory Saturday at the third all-star game in East Lansing, entiremen like MHSFCA president Dick Harris and secretary-ireasurer Don Lessner (to name just two), have put a great deal of time into staging the game, which showdown seems of the best high school football players from the previous season.

The game should continue. That's all there is to it. But making it work is the problem with which the association is confronted. And when it has its annual meeting Nov. 30 to pick the regional football coaches of the year, it must make decisions as to how the game will make meney.

THAT WAS my number one concern when the game originated three years ago. "MICHIGAN STATE is so good in giving us room and board (\$135 per athlete for 10 days), and I doubt we could get that somewhere else, but I don't know," Herrington said. "A move is possible, but it seems the optrate people support it more. I think unless

we get a sponsor to underwrite the game, we won't have a game." Lessner also indicated outstate peo-ple are more supportive, and a move to the Detroit area isn't necessarily the answer.

My personal feeling is to give it a shot closer to the Detroit area. Possible alternatives would be Eastern Michigan, or the Pontlac Silverdome. Eastern and U-M have the facilities, it's just a matter of making it economical for the association.
