

All-Stars shine despite small crowd

Rogers sings 'happy' tune

Bill Rogers is hoping this is his week, but in all reality, he's just happy to be back with "the fella."

Rogers, a 32-year-old who has been the professional at Katke-Cousins Golf Club at Oakland University the past seven years and assistant at the Bloomfield Hills Country Club three years before that, qualified for the 1983 Buick Open, which gets under way today at Warwick Hills Golf and Country Club in Grand Blanc.

The 1972 Eastern Michigan University grad qualified for the Open with a 67 in a PGA sectional qualifying and at Bay Valley. Rogers will join a prestigious field, which includes John Cook, Ben Crenshaw, Bobby Clampett, John Fought, Tom Kite, Calvin Peete, Craig Stadler, Tom Weiskopf and defending champion Lanny Wadkins, so winning is out of the question.

"Obviously, you look to make the cut and then finish as high as you can," Rogers said Tuesday from the locker room at Warwick. "It's no different from any other tournament. It's just fun to be back with the fella."

Rogers said he doesn't play too much on the tour because of his duties at Katke-Cousins, but he does feel fortunate to be able to participate this year.

"I JUST want to thank the people at Oakland University for allowing me the time to do this. I want to represent the members and the university."

Rogers was a touring professional in 1981, when he played in 14 events on the tour. He said he didn't make enough money to stay on. Now he's happy to be back and is hoping to finish in the top 40.

"The way these guys play, they're tough to beat," Rogers said. "They're awfully good. Just to finish anywhere would be a dream come true. I hope I can play well enough in the first round to get into a position where I can relax the next day."

"Where I finish — I know I can't win the thing — I hope will be somewhere in the top 30-40. That would be fun to do that well."

Rogers started strong in the recent Essex International Golf Classic. After 32 holes, he shared the lead, but faltered with a 76 on the third day of play.

I'M PLAYING well this year — not a lot, but when I have played, I've played well. I played 18 holes yesterday with Jim Booros, and I shot a 73. It was very windy, so I was pleased with my score. Just keeping around par (72) is fine."

The Royal Oak Kimball graduate, like Detroit Peete, hangs his hat on driving to the fairway and his strong putting game.

"I'll play conservative and bet on my putter," Rogers said. "I drive straight and putt well. I look to hit the fairways and make the putts. I just hope this is my week to do well."

After the Buick Open, Rogers will gear his thoughts to the State PGA Championships at the Indianwood Golf Club, Sunday through Wednesday, Aug. 21-24, in Lake Orion. Then he will begin his annual ritual of playing out west for eight to 10 weeks during the Christmas season.

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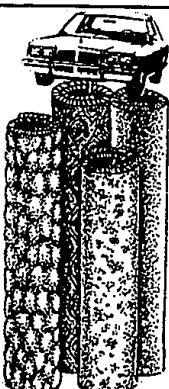
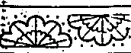
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
