Pianist Schiff delivers rewarding performance

The Meadow Brook Music Festival is now drawing to an end — with this week left. The artistic director of the festival for the last few seasons, Nev-tille Marriner, came here to conduct the final two weeks of this season.

While his contract should have lasted to soe more season, he had asked to be relieved of his duties here at the end of this cost. Marriner, of course, has a very wide international reputation. His name is mostly associated with the Academy of the St. Martin-in-the-Fields, a prominent chamber ensemble that he founded.

His skill in conducting a large major orchestra, however, is not universally acknowledged. His performance on this latest program was an improvement over his performance last season, which was considered by many to be disappointing.

However, some flaws in this per-formance still tend to give some credence to his critics.

THE PROGRAM consisted of the Divertissement' by Ibert, a suite from Der Rosenkavailer' by Richard Straus and the first Plano Concerto by Tchaikovsky. The soloist in the celebrated Tchaikovsky concerto was the young Hungarian-born planist, Andras Schiff.

The Rosenkavaller suite, with its large-scale orchestra characteristics, failed to deliver the appropriate Im-pact. Strauss, who was a master of large orchestration, had the unique ability to combine massive complexity with reflorment. Walls the massive ness was there, at least in terms of de-cibels, the refinement was missing.

Schiff was at least musically successful.

Technically, it is one of the most difficult pieces in the standard plano repettoire, and Schiff was having some difficulties in this area.

SOME of the compounded arpegglos and double octaves in the first movement contained wrong notes, and in the coda of the third movement there were a couple of very rough landings. But there were substantial parts between the flaws that were very rewarding.

Schiff's performance underscored a uniquely refined and reflective ap-proach to this characteristically rough composition, but with no lack of vigor and energy.

Among the other performanaces of this work during the last couple of sea-sons, the last one being during the pre-vious Meadow Brook season with pia-nist Cecile Licad, the present perform-ance was musically the best.

In spite of the deficient technique, it was evident that Schiff has substantial abilities in that department as well. This was simply not his best day.

All things considered, the Tchaikov-sky Piano Concerto is one of those com-positions that could use some rest for the time being.
