## Privately-funded senior complex planned

Construction has begun on a new privately fund-ed senior citizen housing complex in Livonia that is expected to be completed by July 1984, according to Barbara Barr of American House, which will manage the building. The complex, first authorized by the city in Janu-ray 1982, will be located at Plymouth and Farm-nigton Roads. It will be a single-story structure with 64 efficiency-type apartments, architect Leo Stein said.

Dr. Alan Mendelssohn, the owner and developer, described the complex as a congregate care facili-ty. It will not be a nursing home but will have a community dining room where hot meals will be served, he sald. There will be no doctors or nurses

"It is for people in their 60s, 70s and 80s who want security where they live and where they will have associations with other seniors," he said. "The rental price will include one or two hot meals per day and housekeeping service. Mendelssohn, a Southfield physician, stressed that those living at American House Livonia must be able to function on a daily basis without medical assistance.

Teachers are causing to be considered in the fact finding and an expedient contract settlement.

The board spent several hours discussing negotiations before the Aug. 15 meeting.

The only action taken, relative to contract talks, was establishing a Tuesday, Sept. 6 opening day of school for the teaching staff. The first day for students will be wednesday, Sept. 7. Both dates are subject to change, pending further negotiations.

Although spokespersons for both the teachers' union and the board indicated the two sides appear to agree on the starting dates, the gap on other bargaining issues, particularly salary, remains wide.

THE BOARD'S POSITION is based on the fact that teachers were asked last year to give up some of the 10-percent raise negotiated as part of a two-year contract agreement in 1922, according to Rita Thomas, spokesperson for the school board. "The board went to them and said it would help (the district's financial condition) if you wouldn't take the entire 10 percent," Thomas explained. The teachers

refused, and therefore made the board's position more difficult this year, she said. The board boped to find some extra dollars in the district's audit report, presented at the Aug. Is meeting, which might provide some flexibility in its position, Thomas said.

"The report was pretty much what we thought it would be... we didn't find any pot of gold," said Walled Lake Superintendent Don Sheldon.

"There is a lot of concern about the kind


